

BITTER DEBATE OVER EFFORT TO FORBID RECALL

Tweedie Amendment To Disqualify Member Agreeing Is Lost.

ALIEN FRANCHISE UP

Euler Suggests Leaving Alien Voting To British Naturalization Law.

OTTAWA, May 5.—Declaring that an attempt had been made to make unrepresentative the representative Parliament of Canada, T. M. Tweedie, member for West Calgary, today afternoon moved an amendment to the disqualification clause of the franchise bill, which precipitated a lengthy and at times bitter debate. Mr. Tweedie's amendment was for the purpose of disqualifying any man from sitting as a member in the House of Commons who had signed any agreement, whether amounting to resignation or recall, making him subject to the will of a group of his electors. The amendment was opposed by the majority of the members of the House, and the bill followed on a statement made some days ago by O. R. Gould, member for Assiniboia, that he had signed him. A committee of fifteen men who advised him as to the course he should take in the House, and could not recall it if he refused to accept their advice. On the suggestion of Hon. Hugh Guthrie, minister in charge of the bill, Mr. Tweedie expressed himself as willing to withdraw the amendment. However, he objected to the withdrawal of the amendment without the verdict of the House having been expressed through the medium of a vote, and the eyes and noses were turned to the call for the latter resulted in a roar of opposition to the amendment, which was declared lost by the deputy speaker.

Strong Criticisms.
The introduction of the amendment by Mr. Tweedie led to some strong criticisms by members of the opposition, who intimated that as one of the prominent figures in the Conservative party in Alberta, he had supported the principle of the recall. J. P. Reid of MacKenzie said that the principle of the recall was supposed to have been stated by the Conservative party of Alberta from the old non-partisan league of that province. Mr. Tweedie had not been told that of that it was pretty generally understood that he was the punch behind it.

Mr. Tweedie strongly denied having supported the recall, declaring he had always been opposed to it. He was opposed to it now, and saw no reason why he should change his attitude regarding it in the future.

Was Finally Deferred.
The application of the new act to temperance referendums, caused some discussion which was finally deferred on the suggestion of the Opposition leader, C. G. Power, Quebec South, thought the whole matter should be added with the cost of a referendum which might be desired by only a single province, and then taken to the provinces. He expressed the opinion that the Canada temperance act might even be repealed this year.

Whether or not the fine weather was responsible, members showed reluctance to resume their seats after the dinner recess, and the chair was not waited for some time before sufficient members had gathered to constitute a quorum.

Late in the evening the committee reached clause 29, dealing with the alien vote. An amendment was introduced and adopted giving the vote to Indians who had served in the fighting forces, even though they were not franchised as wards of the Government or by reason of tribal allegiance.

Asks Elimination.
W. D. Euler, North Waterloo, asked that the second part of the clause dealing with the enfranchisement of aliens be eliminated altogether, leaving the question of whether an enemy alien shall vote entirely to the decision of naturalization under British law. Mr. Euler thought that an amendment of the bill by the solicitor-general, providing that disqualification under the naturalization act shall not necessarily interfere with the right to vote did not go far enough. Many citizens of enemy origin were entitled to a vote, although they had not completed the ten years' residence necessary for naturalization. And the provision limiting the enfranchisement of married women did not take note of the fact that they might have already been naturalized under British law.

Mr. Euler also suggested that the British Government should legislate to enfranchise citizens who could not qualify under the British naturalization law, but deserved the vote. Canadian naturalization might be given them if imperial naturalization necessarily was withheld.

It was not clear, Mr. Euler asserted, that votes conferred by the amendment might not be taken away through the operation of the naturalization law, and it could be better to eliminate the paragraph altogether.

Mr. Guthrie said the effect of the clause as it originally stood would have been to disenfranchise wives and minor children of men who had become naturalized British citizens. That was not the wish of the Government and the amendment was introduced to overcome that situation by removing the clause that was changed with the adoption of the unified imperial naturalization act of ten years from the date of the war ending. Mr. Guthrie said there were many persons of German descent in Ontario who had voted for years who were not naturalized, and under the Canadian act, which granted naturalization within Canada only, high dignitaries of Canada had gone to England

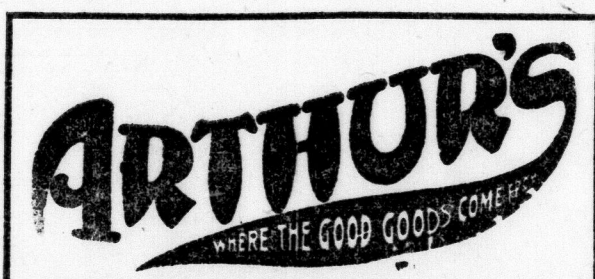

There is a separate company for each ship, and the title to each vessel stands on the separate company, with a mortgage on it in favor of the Government. The Government is responsible for the business carried on by the merchant marine, and accounts are kept showing separately the operations of each vessel.
