CORN BORER SPOILING CROP

Seventy Per Cent of Grain Affected in Some Districts.

Advice received from the department of entomology at Ottawa by Agricultural Representative R. A. Finn here reports that the European corn borer has invaded Welland, Elgin, Haldimand, Oxford and Middlesex counties. Six Dominion investigators have visited Elgin County recently, where the pest is most prevalent, and as a result reported that the township of Malahide has 70 per cent of its corn affected.

The pest manifests itself by holes in the stalks of the corn, with sawdust-like material issuing from them. Broken tassels also indicate the presence of the caterpillar, which can only be identified by specialists. Several native species resembling it, if the infested stems are split open, the caterpillars will be found at work, usually just above the roots. The insect spends the winter as a caterpillar in old stalks of corn or other food plants, and changes to a reddish brown pupa in the spring, which soon turns into a moth. In addition to corn, potatoes, oats, fodder and garden crops are affected.

Suspicious-looking larvae are desired to be sent in tin boxes, as they bore through cardboard. No airholes are required, and small stalks of corn should be inclosed for food. Packages containing same up to twelve ounces sent to Dominion Entomologist, Ottawa, require no postage.

The pest is new here, although in America it was first located in Massachusetts in 1917, and New York two years later. It is believed to have been brought to Ontario—the only infested province—in green corn, it spreads very rapidly, as was noted in Malahide township. The only remedy known is to isolate the affected districts and burn all corn and weeds, including roots in fields where the pest has been noted.

The experts who visited Elgin County also report a great increase in corn smut, and state that unless it is collected from the plants and burned it will prove a serious menace in three years. The Ottawa authorities are alarmed regarding the corn borer, and every effort will be made to stamp it out before it becomes general throughout the country.

PENNY BANK DEPOSITS ARE BELOW AVERAGE

London Pupils Have 3,204 Accounts Totalling \$14,268.

Penny bank deposits in London are considerably below the average for the Dominion, but the statistics show an encouraging increase over previous years. A total of \$1,513 was deposited during May, which was a short month, \$53.66 was placed in the bank. The deposits in May, 1918, were only \$70.25, and in 1919, \$1,338.36. In June, 1918, \$491.19 was deposited, and in 1919, \$825.65. Colborne street school made the best showing, with average deposits of 45 cents. The average for the whole city was 17 cents.

Average deposits for the Dominion were 36 cents. At the end of June, London pupils had 3,204 accounts, with total deposits for the year of \$14,268.10.

SAYS PARENTS CAN AID SCHOOL WORK

Inspector Urges Close Cooperation in Interests Of All.

Both general and detailed instructions regarding public school classes for the present term are contained in a bulletin sent to the principal of each school by Inspector C. B. Edwards.

"The progress of pupils in the public schools is materially assisted when parents, pupils and teachers cordially cooperate in all that pertains to health, to morals and to physical and mental development," Mr. Edwards states. "Home and school work together in perfect harmony. The schools should be a centre from which radiates good will, kindness, helpfulness and inspiration. Such schools will do much to create a high grade of citizenship."

"The play spirit, instinctive in all healthy children, is a powerful impulse toward physical and mental growth, and should be used by the school more freely than it has been in the past. Don't be afraid of taking your classes out of doors, when the weather is suitable for play and exercise, for trips to the woods and fields. Nature study is the study of nature, not the study of books."

"The inspectors desire to take this opportunity to express their hearty approval of the fact that so many members of the staff attended summer courses during the holidays. The desire for professional improvement, which prompted these teachers deserves high praise and material recognition."

Descending to more prosaic matters, the bulletin states that manual training and household science classes will meet as usual and asks teachers recently appointed to bring their certificates to the inspector's office as soon as possible. The principals are asked to give the names of teachers on their staffs who attended summer courses.

Pupils above grade four are advised, if possible, to obtain a suitable dictionary. Other instructions regarding test books are given also.

Elected by Acclamation.
The hour for election having arrived, J. W. Wilkinson nominated President Tom Moore to succeed himself, and he was elected by acclamation, amid wild cheering. In thanking the convention, Mr. Moore stated that he was particularly pleased with the action of the convention, and charged had been made that he was not the representative of organized labor, and he considered the action of the convention a complete vindication.

P. M. Draper was re-elected as secretary-treasurer, also without opposition, on the nomination of J. A. McClelland of Montreal. Mr. Draper also spoke briefly, referring to charges that had been made against him, coupled with the president, of not being loyal to the interests of organized labor, and he considered his election by acclamation a complete vindication.

Several names were placed in nomination for the vice-presidency. Arthur Martell, Montreal; Alexander Drew, Moose Jaw; A. A. Halford, Hamilton; A. H. Mosher, Ottawa; J. Wilkinson, Vancouver; A. E. O'Leary, Toronto; Richard W. Power, Montreal; and James Simpson, Toronto. Of these, Messrs. Wilkinson, O'Leary, Lynch and Simpson withdrew.

In withdrawing, Mr. O'Leary said he had refused to let his name go before the convention a year ago because a club had been hanging over him, but since that time both himself and W. J. Heyes had been cleared "to the hilt" in the courts, and he thought those who had been responsible for branding him a traitor to organized labor should forever hang their heads in shame.

Simpson Declines Nomination.
James Simpson, in declining the nomination, declared that while capitalist courts might give decisions adverse to radical men in the labor movement, he was in the convention as the representative of the Toronto District Trades and Labor Council, and he considered that a sufficient vindication and a tribute to his sincerity.

The result of the ballot showed Arthur Mitchell, Montreal; Alex. McAndrew, Moose Jaw, and H. A. Halford, Hamilton, elected.

W. F. Bush, Toronto, and Fred Bancroft, Toronto, were nominated for fraternal delegate to the American Federation of Labor, and Mr. Bancroft withdrew, so that Mr. Bush was elected by acclamation.

Provincial Executives.
Provincial executives were elected as follows: Quebec—Guastave Franco, chairman, and Messrs. A. Bouchard, O. Fleury and A. Belland. Ontario—J. Ralph, chairman; D. A. Dear, A. A. Carroll and W. J. Jeffrey. Manitoba—H. W. Power, E. Pickett, B. Robertson and W. McCormick. Saskatchewan—James Somerville, Angus McKinnon, R. J. Moore and J. A. Regan.

British Columbia—Secretary Woodward of the Victoria Trades and Labor Council, chairman, and other members will be selected by the executive council of the congress.

The executive will select the provincial executive for Prince Edward Island and the New Brunswick and Nova Scotia federations select their own executive.

Five names were placed in nomination for fraternal delegate to the British Trades Union Congress. J. G. Foster, Montreal; Thos. Izzard, Toronto; Fred Bancroft, Toronto; J. W. Wilkinson, Vancouver, and Wm. Lodge, Ottawa, but all but the first two withdrew and Mr. Foster was elected.
