WARS RUMBLE IN 'PEACE YEAR'

All Europe and Asia Torn — Sternest Fight Between Poles and Russians.

PARIS, Jan. 26. - The world hailed 1920 as "peace year." but the familiar sound of battle rolled unceasingly through many parts of Europe and Asia. All the big powers, with the exception of the United States and Russia, had signed treaties or joined the League of Nations, but the whole year was mark-ed by wars, revolutions and attempted

military coups.

Fighting was continuous in Russia and Turkey. Civil war broke out in China. Germany had a narrow escape from civil war when a small clique of German militarists under Von Kapp attempted to seize the Berlin govern-ment on March 13. Violent strife has raged and continues to rage in Ireland. The year ends with a virtual collapse, for the present, of the movement for universal disarmament. The United States is maintaining nearly a quarter of a million men under arms, and is executing a naval program that will make her the first sea power in the world unless Great Britain enlarges her program. And Japan has served notice on the League of Nations that she will not disarm so long as the United States continues to increase her land and sea

Biggest War In Russia. The biggest war of 1920 was fought between Soviet Russia and Poland. Enraged at the territorial encroachments of Poland, and possibly seeing an ortunity to push Bolshevism westward, the soviet massed a great army against the Poles. Fighting broke out in March, and soon a terrific struggle was raging over a battle front approximately 500 miles lon.

The Poles were successful in the initial fighting, but the Russians rallied, mashed the Polish front, and were on he point of taking Warsaw when, with rench and British help, the Poles beat off the invaders. About six months of folent fighting peace negotiations were pened at Minsk, but were later transerred to Riga, where they are still in

Excepting for the Polish war, 1920 vas a successful military year for Red Russia. Three extensive campaigns were conducted against the soviet with allied assistance, but all collapsed. They were led by Almiral Kolchak, who was executed in Siberia, following his overthrow by Gen. Denekin, who fled to England after his army was defeated and scattered in South Russia, and by Gen. Baron Wrangel, who fled to Turey after his army was crushed in

Reds and Turks Allies.

During 1920 Red Russia entered into an alliance with the Turkish National-ists under Mustapha Kemal Pasha. Together they smothered Armenia into submission. The present state of Armenia, about as big as an American county, lies in the Caucasus Mountains outside the borders of the old Ottoman

The military ambitions of the soviet vere reaching into Persia even while Red armies were contending against the Poles and Gen. Wrangel, but the British put an army into Persia and compelled the Russians to withdraw. Red troops were landed at Enzell, Persia, from thirteen transports in May, and threat-ened to march on Teheran and convert Persia into a soviet republic. The British army which drove out the Rus-sians is still maintained in Persia as a ulwark for the protection of India.

The thunder of battle has roared almost without pause throughout the old Turkish Empire, with four allied armies arrayed against the Arabs and Turkish Nationalists. Although little news has reached the outer world from Mesopo-tamia, that obscure quarter of the world has for months been the theatre of a violent struggle between a British army of nearly 100,000 men and strong forces

French Quell Arabs.

In the interior of Anatolia the brunt of the fighting on the allied side fell on the Greek army, which was sent to crush the Nationalists. On the Marcrush the Nationalists. On the Mar-mora littoral the British and Turks were at grips, but the fire from British warships compelled the Turks to retire to the hinterland. In Syria the French to war against the Arabs because the Arabs refused to accept the French mandate. Only a brief campaign was necessary to quell Arab resistance. But little fighting fell to the lot of the Italian forces of occupation in Turkey. Only the lack of transport and the mbroilments in Western and Southern Russia prevented Siberia from becoming great battlefield during 1920. The Japanese occupied vast stretches of Siberian territory in defiance to the soviet, meanwhile giving assistance to the anti-Bolshevik army of Gen. Semenoff's army, but were not strong enough to go to war against the
