EXONERATES VICE-PRESIDENT.
Quebec, Aug. 17.—(Special).—The
widely published criticism of Mr.
Fairbanks' conduct at Quebec during
the visit of the Prince of Wales has
called out a vigorous protest from
Lieutenant-Governor Jetté.

can and Canadian papers:
"What business was it of Mr. Fair-
banks to stand ahead of Sir Louis
Jetté, the governor of the province at
the garden party in honor of the
prince, to receive the guests? Pure
cheek, I call it."
To-night the governor's secretary
published a letter saying that his hon-
or could not let the assertion pass without
contradiction, and adds the following
statement:
"It is not true that the vice-presi-
dent stood ahead of Sir Louis Jetté at
the garden party at Spencerwood. The
Lieutenant-Governor, Sir Louis Jetté,
the vice-president invited him and
Mrs. Fairbanks to receive the invited guests
with himself and Lady Jetté and from
the same motive of doing honor to the
occasion the vice-president and Mrs.
Fairbanks consented to do so.
When Sir Louis Jetté arrived, both
Sir Louis and Lady Jetté had to go
and receive him at the door, so that
Vice-President and Mrs. Fairbanks were
left alone to shake hands with the in-
coming guests who were introduced to
them by myself in the usual way, and
as above stated, at the special request
of the hosts themselves. It is much to be
regretted that such an ordinary and
most proper proceeding should have
been given an interpretation which
nothing in the manner, and intention
of the vice-president could justify."

MAGISTRATE IS SEVERE ON MAYOR'S ACTIONS
City's Endeavors to Square Leslie Matters Are Criticised in Court
Sharp words of censure on the neglect of Mayor Oliver and the police authorities to prosecute Col. J. K. Leslie when the original shortage of \$16,000 was discovered were spoken by Magistrate Denison on the resumption of the preliminary enquiry yesterday.
Col. Denison made some biting references to the advice given the mayor by Corporation Counsel Fullerton, wherein the latter said that the city's first duty was to recover the money and that there was no obligation to prosecute. The magistrate reaffirmed his belief that illegal means had been taken to obtain restitution.
The only witnesses called were auditor Harry Vigon and the mayor. The former told of the dramatic scene in the mayor's office following the exposure and also of the manipulation of figures to make the bank pass-book look correct. As for the mayor, he had to hear a brutal report of the cash book for 1904 was \$266,536.66, with payments of \$247,890.54, leaving a balance of \$18,646.12, which, with an overdraft at the bank of \$7,814, made the amount that should be on hand \$10,832.18. Errors in addition in the cash book had been rectified since the audit, it seemed that \$10,000 had been left out. He mentioned this to Mr. Leslie on July 26th. The association is allowed to keep \$10,000 in hand, and he said that the magistrate was not satisfied to conceal the fact of a deficit from the auditors.
"Well, so far as I am concerned, I asked Mr. Leslie, and he acknowledged it," said the magistrate. "Why not the rest?"
"That was the first I asked about. It was \$10,000 in round figures. That was left out of the accounting of the year. It was not there then."
"What did he say then? Did he admit it?"
"Yes, he said it was not there."
"Did he explain?"
"No, I said he'd better come with me to the City Hall."
"Did he admit it to the mayor?"
"Yes, in his office."
Vigon then told how he had informed the mayor that Mr. Leslie had admitted being out at least \$10,000. The mayor made a remark and then he spoke of the fact, and asked Leslie if it was true.
Col. Denison—"What, did Leslie say?"
Mr. Leslie said, "Yes, that comes of helping my friends."
"Did Leslie make a written report?"
Witness—"I believe there was some communication, but I did not see it."
The witness said that he did not see the bank pass-book when auditing the account, but that he saw the Imperial Bank showed a deficit. The initial error was in not carrying forward an item of \$9,997, which entry was later made to make the book balance.
Mr. Vigon said a deposit of \$35,000 had been made after the arrest this year, and that he had no doubt there was a balance of \$10,000. He be-
lieved Col. Leslie had tried to correct mistakes in bookkeeping. A blank had been given to the auditor, and as the to allow the addition of the \$9,997.
Speaking of the guard placed on the colonel following the discovery of the deficit, the magistrate said that he had taken precaution to prevent his hurting him-
self.
On Mr. Vigon saying that the 1908 accounts had not been examined, the crown attorney said he wished the enquiry to remain open till the books were audited, and there might be further enlightenment.
Mr. Dewar remarked that the short-
age had been made up, whereupon the witness said that he had not seen the public money gone. This man has used it or appropriated it. It's been gone a year and it's been so covered up that the detectives have been unable to find any of it. When it was found that the money was gone attempts were made to square it out to the satisfaction of the public. It was a grossly irregular, and I am sorry that anybody in the police should have had anything to do with it.
Mayor Oliver was then called. He reviewed the scene in his office when the disclosure was made, and said Corpora-
tion Counsel Fullerton advised him that the city's first duty was to secure the money. "Not to prevent crime," suggested the magistrate and the witness replied, "No, it was not." He produced a letter from Mr. Fullerton read-
ing in part: "My advice was that your first duty was to endeavor to recover or secure to the exhibition the money, and that you were bound in so doing not to any extent whatever to compromise a crime of crime there was in connection therewith; secondly, after recovering or securing the money you were not under any obligation, either as Mayor of Toronto or as a citizen of Toronto, to enter a criminal prosecution, even if satisfied that a crime had been committed, and that re-
covery could be guided entirely by your own views of the matter."
It ought to be published as a curi-
osity, and it was not. He produced the letter, explaining that, not being a lawyer, he had merely sought to get back the money, knowing that Col. Leslie could get it. The board of con-
trol thought the Exhibition Association should take steps, if any, toward pro-
secution. The directors offered to pro-
duce the \$10,000. So far as he was con-
cerned, there would have been no prosecution. The magistrate suggested that the board of control should have been an inducement held out for the giving of security, but the mayor de-
clined any such purpose.
The magistrate then said that under the circumstances this is an illegal agreement and that you cannot hold the money. You might ask Mr. Fullerton to write another letter on that," said the magistrate.
The case was then adjourned.

boasted of his relations with Mrs. Stickle, and it was his claim that no woman could resist him. General Stickle waited for him and killed him instantly in the street. The general was defended by James T. Brady, one of the best known criminal lawyers of the time, and was acquitted after a stirring plea to the jury. The case was cited as a precedent during the first Shaw trial.
Brother Killed Man Once Before.
It is recalled that this is the second tragedy in which T. Jenkins Hains has figured. For in 1891, when he was twenty-nine years old, he shot and killed his most intimate friend, Ed-
ward Hanneagan, a young man who, like himself, was prominent in Wash-
ington society, after a trivial quarrel while the two were in a canoe at Fort Monroe. He was acquitted on the ground that he had acted in self-defence, but the verdict aroused so much adverse comment that many indignation meetings were held to express the popular feeling of disapproval of the findings.
Captain Hains, the chief figure in the drama, is a slight man of thirty-six. He wears glasses of enormous size upon an aquiline nose, and has much more the appearance of a student than of a soldier. Nevertheless, he has several letters written by Capt. Hains to her husband threatening his life.
When she saw Captain Hains and his brother at Bayside just before the shooting, she shouted a warning to her husband and begged him not to come to the landing from his yacht while the shooting was in progress. Mrs. Hains did not believe Capt. Hains would shoot her husband, she says, but thought he wanted to serve papers in a divorce proceeding.
"Broken-Hearted" Brother Wrote.
L. A. Page, a Boston publisher, who is stopping at the Hotel Breckin, and who has published a number of public letters he says he received from T. Jenkins Hains more than a month ago, said the writer referred to the trouble between Hains and his wife. That part of the letter which has a bearing on the case reads:
"I wish you would come and visit us. I want to see you very much at this time. I am in great distress—due to a family quarrel. My brother is broken-hearted on account of a scandalous magazine writer who has broken up his home. Can you not come and help me out?"
Locked in the safe of the Flushing police station is another bit of evidence that will be used at the trial of the Hains brothers.
While Mr. Annis was lying on the floor of the Bayview Yacht Club, where he had been shot, a friend, Mr. Rockwell, scribbled on an envelope these words:
"Shot by Captain Peter C. Hains, U.S.A., Aug. 15."
This was handed to the dying man, and he signed his name to it.
ANOTHER PROSECUTION.
Adamson Case Will Be Ventilated in Police Court.
It is understood that, within the next few days, a formal information will be laid against George Adamson, who was formerly a clerk in the water-
works branch of the city treasurer's department, and in whose accounts there was discovered a shortage of about \$2400.
The deficit was found to exist months ago, but as a previous shortage had been made good by Mr. Adamson's friends, time was given Mr. Adamson, who was much broken in health, to make restitution. BARNARDO BOY DROWNS.
Slits While Swimming at Smith's Falls.—Had Been in Toronto.
SMITH'S FALLS, Aug. 17.—(Special).—A young man, a stranger here, was drowned while bathing in the Rideau River to-day. Some boys who were near him saw his disappearance and when he did not come up one of them dived for him and found him lying in the bed of the river. He had not more than five minutes elapsed from the time he went down, two hours of skilled work failed to resuscitate him. A letter in his pocket from his mother, undated, but written from Hope-street, Holloway, England, disclosed the fact that the name of the unfortunate young man was George Peter-Gutteridge. It was addressed to Peter-street, Toronto, and redirected to care of R. Lyon, New Boyne. There was also a notice dated Aug. 4 from the Bank of Ottawa, here, noting the death of the \$100 which was at his credit in the Queen and Spadina branch of the bank in Toronto, and for which he had been permitted to draw. It could not be paid without permission from the Barnardo Home, as he was not of age.
In Canada Five Years.
Alfred B. Owen, superintendent of the Barnardo Boys' Home, said last night that Gutteridge came out to Canada five years ago as a boy of 12, and that he had been employed on a farm in New Boyne ever since, and had a good record. An officer of the home left yesterday for Smith's Falls, where the body will be buried.
TO NAME CANDIDATE.
Independents Call on Trades Unionists to Get Busy.
If the Independent Labor party convention to-night at the Labor Temple is as lively as the discussions regarding it were there last night the proceedings will be exceedingly interesting. The members of various unions as they left their meetings last night, lingered to vigorously discuss the political situation, the opinion being expressed that a popular labor candidate can make a most interesting fight in South Toronto in the federal contest.
A Curious Coincidence.
Since the Olympic games were revived in 1896, this year the first occasion on which they have coincided with the ancient Olympic lunar epoch. Among the ancient Greeks the day of the quadrennial Olympic games was celebrated by the full moon next after the summer solstice. By coincidence rather than by design, July 13, the opening day of the London games, was also the day of the first full moon after the summer solstice. Falling as it did this year in the month of July, the coincidence becomes still more remarkable, says The New York Sun. By the Greek calendar the day of the full moon was always the 14th of the month, and therefore the present mid-July games at the stadium, judged by the moon's age, the month of the year, could hardly approximate nearer to the actual time of the national games of ancient Greece.
Royal Chickens of Japan.
The most beautiful and extraordinary of chickens in the world are those bred by the royal family of Japan. The privilege of raising them not being accorded to any of the nikudo's subjects, the Emperor's court of Tokyo, the chickens are celebrated for the wonderful growth of their tall feathers, a full-grown rooster's tail often reaching a length of 20 feet. The tail is of a lovely deep blue shade, while the body is buff and about the neck is a white ring. A pair of these chickens has been known to sell to a wealthy Englishman for \$1000 on condition that he would take them out of the country.
"I believe that ere long the species will entirely disappear, as I heard before leaving Japan that it was the intention of His Majesty to breed," Baltimore American.
Up Against Labor Families.
