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DANGER SIGNALS.

Japanese doctors have certainly achieved a marvelous record in conection with disease in General -ection with disease in General Oku's Manchurian army. Since the landing on the mainland on May 6, there have been treated 24.642 cases of disease, out of which only 40 resulted fatally. The claim made that these figures are unexam-pled in the history of warfare seems indubitable. Even more striking is the fact that there have only been 183 cases of typhoid and 342 of dysentery, altho of beri-beri there were no less than 5070. This latter disease — the name being a reduplication of a Cin-galese word meaning "weakness" — is common in Japan, where it is known as only 40 resulted fatally. 
