### SENATE ACTION

HAS EFFECT IN WALL STREET

Improvement Attributed to Defeat of Measure For High Tax on War Profits

New York, Sept. 6.—The further improvement shown at the opening of today's stock market was generally attributed to the defeat of the high tax on war profits in the senate. Equipment and other issues most concerned in the government's taxation plan opened at gains of one to one and a quarter points, and investment rails also strengthened, especially Pacific. United States Steel opened at 106 1/2 to 106 3/4, an advance gain of 1 1/2, but soon reacted to 107 1/2. The entire list made irregular when New York broke three and three-eighths points, to the new record of 27 1/2.

Pressure was again effective during the morning. New Haven's further collapse provoking further selling of rails, New York Central made a new low record at 75. Union Pacific surrendered all its gain and other rails reacted one to two points. Steel rallied to 108 1/2 and other industrials were equally heavy. General Motors broke 91 1/4 and various specialties yielded one to three. Irregular rallies set in at noon.

London, Sept. 6.—The stock market was quiet today, but the steady undertone continued in most of the departments, especially gilt-edged securities, rubber stocks and Japanese bonds. The latter advanced on redemption prices. Spanish bonds were weak after temporary firmness. Argentine rails were easy on strike rumors, and American securities irregular. Money was in good supply and discount rates were quiet.

### LONDON STOCK MARKET

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### STATEMENT OF BANK OF ENGLAND

London, Sept. 6.—The weekly statement of the Bank of England shows the following changes: Total reserve, decreased 278,000 pounds; circulation, increased 266,000 pounds; bullion, decreased 14,900 pounds; other securities, decreased 2,064,000 pounds; other deposits decreased 6,097,000 pounds; government securities decreased 100,000 pounds.

The proportion of the bank's reserve to liabilities this week is 18.92 per cent; last week it was 18.21 per cent.

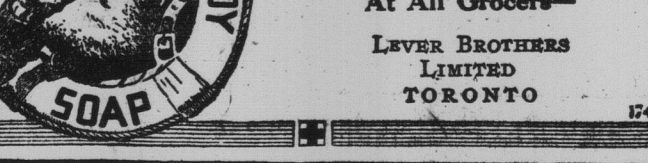
