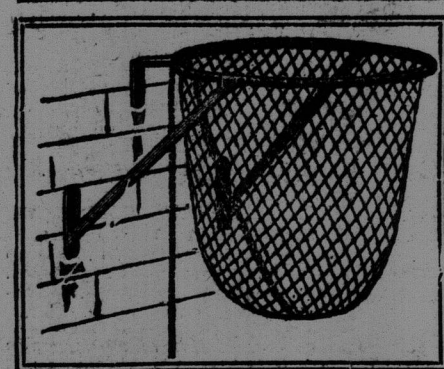

COMMITTEE TO AID WOUNDED

Extensive Plans Arranged—Sec-
retary of Military Hospitals Com-
mission Tells of Needs—The
New Members

In order to cope with the problem of
caring for the larger number of wound-
ed soldiers who will be returning from
the front, the local committee was great-
ly strengthened at a meeting of the may-
or's office on Saturday afternoon.

Mr. Scammell, secretary of the mili-
tary hospitals commission, was present
and presented the needs of the work, tell-
ing of the way in which the soldiers are
to be cared for.

Mr. Scammell presented to the meet-
ing the great work that would devolve
upon the St. John committee during the
coming season, as wounded soldiers will
be coming here all winter, passing
through to other parts of Canada, be-
ginning perhaps not more than a week
from now.

To deal with the matter, Mayor
Prink, who acted as chairman, suggested
an enlargement of the reception com-
mittee, of which the present chairman
is C. B. Lockhart, and the secretary
is R. S. Ritchie. Nearly all at the
meeting were named and in addition
several others not in attendance were ap-
pointed.

Mr. Lockhart remains as chairman.
