MORE LOOTING.

SYDNEY, N. S., June 15—An attempt early this morning to loot the warehouse of the British Empire Steel Corporation at Glace Bay was frustrated by the town police assisted by the special constables recruited from the ranks of the United Mine Workers of America.
