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**NEW BOARD WILL
CENSOR MOVIES**

**Four Members Named and
All Are of Saint
John**

The announcement of the appointment of a complete new board of moving picture censors is made and substantiated a report heard during the last week that such a change was forthcoming. The new board will have for its chairman Frank J. McInerney, merchant tailor of Mill street and with him will act Miss Alice Fairweather, who has been connected with newspaper work and the film business for several years; Mrs. George Carvell, interested in educational activities, and Stephen W. Palmer, barrister, and member of the Board of School Trustees. The board will hereafter be composed of four members instead of six as originally appointed.

THE OUTGOING BOARD

The outgoing board consisted of John B. Jones, chairman, during the illness of Dr. H. S. Bridges; Edmund G. Owens, formerly of Macaulay Bros. & Co.; Michael D. Cole, retired manufacturer; George Amland, furniture dealer; Mrs. Arthur W. Adams and Mrs. A. C. Wilson, former public school teacher and special representative of the Local Council of Women. The old board underwent several changes since the inception of the censorship idea.

SAINT JOHN CENTRE

Saint John is the centre of the most easterly film zone in Canada and shares with Montreal, Toronto, Winnipeg and Calgary the benefits of this active enterprise. There are nine important agencies representing all American producing corporations and employing directly and indirectly between 60 and 75 people with a wage distribution in the order of \$3,000 a week, to which are added our rent, expenses, taxes, insurance, etc. The transportation phase of the business is exclusively express, seven hundred of heavy packages being in transit from Saint John through the Maritime Provinces and Newfoundland and back to Saint John every week.

CENSORING HEADQUARTERS

The New Brunswick Board of Censors is therefore the first to view films coming into the Maritime Provinces, although the Ontario and Quebec prints of pictures passed on to this territory already bear the labels of the censor boards in these upper provinces in addition to the original view of the National Board of Review of the United States Government, which examines all pictures as they come from the laboratories. In other words moving pictures shown in Saint John are censored three times before they are shown here and are afterwards re-viewed by Censor O'Connor of Nova Scotia. Prince Edward Island is satisfied with New Brunswick's judgment in the matter.

CENSORING NO SINECURE

The censoring of pictures is not so easy a task as it would appear. It entails a continuous grind throughout the week of from 15 to 25 story productions and miscellaneous reels, sometimes amounting as high as a total of 200,000 feet of film. The work is divided among the censors and done in private screening rooms of the film agencies. The retiring Board of Censors say that since they had assumed office the necessity for condemning outright whole productions had become very rare and excisions were not nearly as numerous as in the early days.

APPRECIATION

Members of the retiring Board of Censors spoken to today by a Times-Star reporter expressed appreciation of the co-operation given them by film agency managers and the theatre people in an effort to make screen entertainment morally harmless and wholly acceptable to the public.
