The New Brunswick Board of Censors is therefore the first to view films coming into the Maritime Provinces, although the Ontario and Quebec prints of pictures passed on to this territory already bear the labels of the censor by a fas in these upper provinces in addition to the original vise of the National Board of Review of the United States Government, which examines all pictures as they come from the laboratories, In other words moving pictures shown in Saint John are censored three times before they are shown here and are afterwards re-viewed by Censor O'Connor of Nova Scotia.
