REV. W. SMALL GIVES  
ADDRESS ON CHINA

Rev. Walter Small delivered an interesting address last evening before the Young People's Association of Queen Square Methodist church on "Conditions in China." Mr. Small, who is enjoying a well-earned furlough after eight years in the mission field, explained the political and military situation in Western China. He said that the present civil war was merely a continuation of the fighting which has gone on ever since the establishment of the republic, but that the hostilities had now reached the coast and were reaching more prominence than formerly, as newspaper correspondents were able to learn more easily what was going on.

The speaker wore the robes of a mandarin and showed the audience several beautiful pieces of Chinese implements of utility and several miniature models of instruments used for the punishment of criminals.
