The street had never been deeded to the city, so far as he knew, but in this respect it was like many of the streets in that part of the city. There were six houses at present in the streets. He moved that the plan of the street, as presented, be adopted and the grade approved of.

Mayor Potts said he had been interviewed by J. T. Knight in regard to a charge made by the harbor department of 20 cents a ton on bagged grain. 
