City Cornet Band Anniversembles semblies Here.

Last Tuesday was the forty-seventh anniversary of the founding of the City Cornet Band, and in this connection some interesting facts relating to the band's early activities might be spoken of. Invitations are in existence for parties and social gatherings which the band conducted in the years 1875, 1876, 1877 and 1878. On Tuesday, November 23, 1875, a "Sash and Belt Party" was held in Small's Hall in Dock street, and music was provided by the City Cornet Band, and D. S. McLaughlan, members of the old Father Matthew Association. The programme was printed on white paper with gold letters on the outside and brown ink inside.

On Wednesday, November 29, 1876, a "Leap Year Quadrille Assembly," with music by the City Cornet Band, was held in the same hall, and the committee were William Wallace, B. McGowan, W. Calhoun, J. Sullivan, and William Walsh, secretary. The invitation for

W. Calhoun, J. Sullivan, and William Walsh, secretary. The invitation for this affair was printed in old-fashioned script letters on a sheet of mauve laid

paper.

Another "Social Quadrille Assembly"
was held on Monday, April 2, in the following year in McGourty's Hall in Germain street. In this case the committee's names were not on the invitation, but that of James Connolly was affixed as .750 secretary. It might also be noted that coaches were advertised as in attendance coaches were advertised as in attendance at the hall for the use of those attending.

The next invitation is one to a series of "Quadrille Assemblies" to be held in Dockrill's Hall, Union street, commencing on January 9, 1878, and in charge of W. Higgins, F. Shechan, W. Ward, J. Dixon and J. Connolly, secretary.

In the collection, also, is a badge for the World's Fair, Chicago. It is of white satin with a shiny clasp. It bears the inscription: "City Cornet Band, St. John, N. B., World's Fair, 1893." FRIDAY and SATURDAY ONLY
