

THE BITUMINOUS COAL CRISIS.
(Toronto Globe.)

The coal crisis in Canada is acute. It calls for cautious conduct. As the Globe previously pointed out, the wise way to handle the situation lies in an earnest effort to secure co-operation with the United States in international distribution. Canada imports from the adjoining republic some seven times the amount of bituminous coal which she exports to that country. She cannot afford to neglect any opportunity for joint action.

Yet from Ottawa has come a peremptory order prohibiting the export of Canadian coal across the border. This order, the Globe is informed, was issued without any consultation or conference with the United States authorities. The result was such as might have been expected. Washington quite naturally takes the position that Canada by so doing relieved her big neighbor of responsibility in sharing supplies. It is inclined to take the attitude that, the dominion having without provocation cut off its export to the United States, there is no reason for the United States to worry about providing fuel for Canada. This is a most unfortunate and serious development of Ottawa's ill-advised action.

There is only one course for both countries to follow. There must be the fullest understanding and the closest co-operation. The situation is acute on either side of the boundary line. By working together in reciprocal effort the joint supplies can be assigned geographically to serve most advantageously the needs in each country. This is a time for both governments to unite in a common policy of mutual assistance.

Peculiar Strike, This.
Sydney, Nov. 25.—The strike of Glace Bay clerks has been called off. The strike was unique in that it was called by the clerks in support of the manager's action in discharging a fellow employee by whom he had been assaulted. The directors reinstated the discharged man and the strike resulted. Kid Burns, prize fighter, who was the cause of the trouble, has been again suspended and the clerks go back to work.

POTATO PRODUCTS.
(Bangor Commercial.)

Potato-product industries in the United States afford an outlet for millions of bushels of low-grade potatoes formerly wasted annually and may absorb the surplus in years when the crop is exceptionally large.

The manufacture of potato flour is a new industry here, and the potato-starch industry, although long established, has been declining of recent years, principally because of the severe competition of foreign potato starch and of the lower priced corn-starch. Before the war the imports from Germany and Holland were only slightly less than the domestic production. Recently Japan has greatly developed her starch industry; in 1918 she exported into the United States nearly 22,000,000 pounds, or 92 per cent of the total imports.

During our participation in the war dried or dehydrated potatoes were prepared for army use, and the industry assumed considerable importance. Sixteen factories were drying potatoes in 1918 and their output was 7,000,000 pounds.


