RECENT DEATHS

Dr. Silas Alward, K. C., one of the best known and most highly esteemed of St. John's citizens, died at his home, "Shanahan's" Mount Pleasant, at 5 o'clock yesterday afternoon. Dr. Alward, who was in his seventy-ninth year, had been ill for many months past, and of late had been gradually sinking. News of his death will be heard with much regret here and throughout this province in the public life of which he long occupied a prominent place.

He was born at Brunswick, Queens county, nearly seventy-nine years ago. He was a son of the late John Alward and a grandson of Benjamin Alward, a New England Loyalist, who came from New Jersey at the close of the American revolution.

Dr. Alward was educated at Acadia College and Brown University. He entered Acadia in 1856, and graduated B. A. in 1860, and M. A. in 1862. In 1862 he received the degree of D. C. L. from the same college. He graduated from Brown University—ad eundem—in 1869.

He also received the degree of D. C. L. from King's College, Windsor, in 1895. Dr. Alward began the study of law in the office of C. N. Skinner, and was called to the bar in 1865. He was appointed an advisory member of the commission on law and practice and constitution of the courts in 1867. He was created Q. C. by the Earl of Derby in 1891. Long an eminent figure in the legal profession, Dr. Alward was for several years president of the St. John Law Society and was dean of the St. John Law School, a branch of King's College. He was well known both as a lecturer on law and on popular subjects. Dr. Alward was prominently identified with political life until a few years ago, having been twice elected to the provincial legislature by acclamation. He went through three contests, being defeated in 1900. He was first returned as a representative of the liberal party in 1867, but from March 1888, up to 1897 was in active opposition to the Blair government. He was re-elected by acclamation in 1904 and served until 1909. Among his contributions to political literature have been two brochures, "The Issues of the Day" and "The Record of the Tory Party," both published in 1887.

While in active politics, Dr. Alward was recognized as one of the ablest public speakers in the ranks of his party. After a period of political inactivity he took part in the Dominion campaign of 1911, speaking to large audiences here and in other counties.

Dr. Alward was twice president of the Mechanics' Institute, was a member of the school board, and for a number of years was a governor of Acadia College. He was one of the directors of the Home for Incurables.

Dr. Alward married in 1869, Emeline, daughter of P. Wickwire, of Canimau (N.S.). She died in 1878. He was married Miss Sarah Edith Turnbull, daughter of the late W. W. Turnbull. His widow and three sons survive him—Ernest, Wallace and Cedric, the two latter having recently returned to Canada from service overseas.

Ex-Senator Spoozer.

INDIA AND PROHIBITION

Calcutta, India, June 13—The action of the United States in the matter of prohibition is having its effect in India. It is announced that the Maharaja of Bhavnagar, one of the principal Kathiawar chiefs, has directed the preparation of a scheme to be brought into force on his next birthday, for the abolition of a very large majority of the existing liquor shops in his state, and for the eventual total extinction of the trade in intoxicating liquors. His highness, it is stated, has been contemplating this step for a long time, and by way of preliminary approached the other princes in Kathiawar some time ago with a view to joint action. Apparently he has decided not to wait until his brother chiefs are converted to his point of view, but to launch out for himself, with a view to convincing them, by a practical demonstration, of the benefits to be derived from a sober state.


