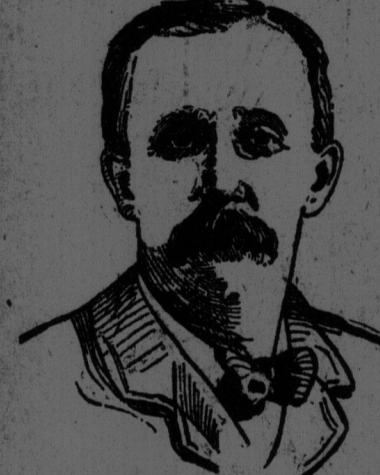

TWO INQUESTS

BORDEN AND HIS FOLLOWERS ARE EARLY ON GRILL

Call on Speaker to Save Them As They Withe

MANITOBA OUTRAGES

Uneasy as Misdeeds in Election Are Recounted—Strong Fighting Speech of Sir Wilfrid Putnam in Passion—Searching Questions

Ottawa, Nov. 25.—The first working day of the session ended in a row. Hon. Frank Oliver charged the government, and particularly the Hon. Robert Rogers, with having denied the right of free speech in Manitoba during the recent MacDonald election and with having caused the arrest of respectable citizens for doing legitimate canvassing in the campaign. The story was more than the government could stand and its completion was suppressed by a denial of the right of free speech in Ottawa. Mr. Oliver had told the story of the arrest of Liberal canvassers in Manitoba and their detention in jail without trial or bail until the election was over when they were dismissed because the justice authorities came into court and stated that they had no evidence to offer.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier

Sir Wilfrid Laurier had assigned the government in the afternoon in the first place, he had said that the government's speech from the throne contained only what could not possibly be left out. He said that not much could be expected in the way of trade from the trade agreement with the West Indies, because there was not much trade carried on by the southern islands. He charged the government with having failed to introduce the highways aid bill this session and with having killed it last session because the senate had made an amendment to the bill, which greatly improved it. He had been expected that there would be something said about the naval policy today. The London Times, however, stated that the policy in his opinion is not the best, because in his opinion the navy is too small.

Hot Shot for the Nationalists

Those who say that we owe nothing to England are less numerous than before the twenty-first of September. It is on the other side of the house, and even on the treasury benches, who in the province of Quebec before September 21, said that we owe nothing to England. Since that date there has been a mighty change in their views, therefore there is nothing to apprehend.

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SERVING WAR CHIEF WHO FIGHTS FROM BATH CHAIR

General Putnik's Active Soldiering Days Past, But a Brilliant Organizer—Greatest Dread Now Draughts

Belgrade, Nov. 24.—A crabbled, wheezy hypochondriac in a cushioned armchair, a shawl on his knees, a muffler round his throat, with a chart on the table before him, a cup of black coffee in his hand, that is General Putnik, the organizer of the Serbian plan of campaign. His active soldiering days are long past. He has made three campaigns, and was a lieutenant leader in his time. He is out of touch with the new generation, and his acquaintance with existing conditions is drawn from interviews with responsible military experts here in his own overcast room. One long glance at the face of his visitor and his eyes are not again lifted from the chart. A few, a very few, questions, fewer notes, figures mostly scribbled in the margin in a nervous, hurried hand, and he relapses into inactivity, apparently oblivious of his visitor or the visitor's remarks. There is no formal close to the interview. Whether the one-eyed colossus be carried on for half an hour or two minutes, there is no sign of weariness or interest in the torpid attitude of the general. A faint grunt shows his acquiescence as the visitor rises to withdraw, and as the door opens he draws his rag more closely round him. The general has a horror of draughts.
