In its report of Premier Fleming's speech at Newcastle, the North Shore Leader says:

"The premier is also engaged in working out a plan which he hopes to present to the legislature to take over farming lands, partially improved, improving them, and giving them to the settlers at a small cost in easy instalments. He believes that the plan would work out with splendid results. It will be open to any New Brunswick boy, as well as outsiders.

Concluding Premier Fleming said: "I am intensely interested in this subject of immigration. I feel that the East has not had its fair share of the publicity undertaken by the federal government in the past. But an active campaign will now be carried on in the old country and we will adopt a plan and system of placing the people on the lands and affording them employment. We want to provide ready-made farms."
