WINTER STREET

Have Highest Aggregate in Athletic Meet—Albert School Second.

The events for classes 2 and 3 of the schoolboy track meet were completed yesterday afternoon on the grounds of the Y. M. C. A. 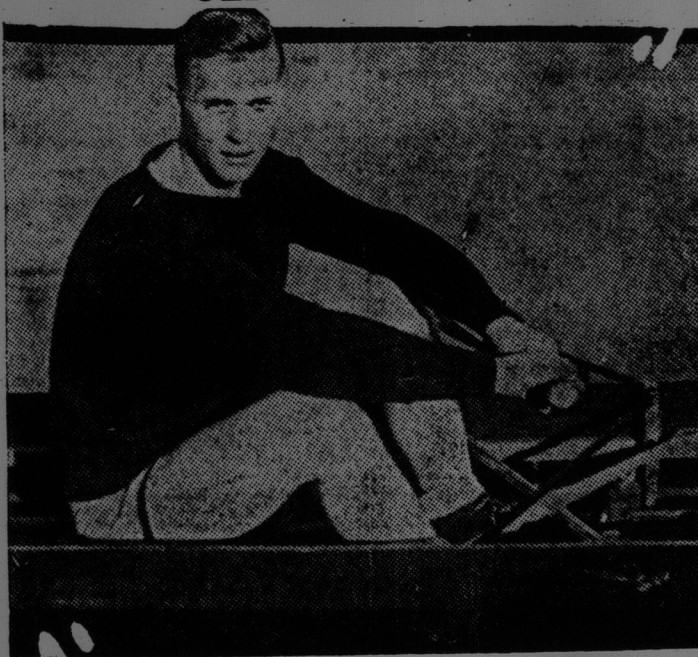

IS NOT GOING TO
MONCTON TRYOUTS

Gorman Decided to Stay Out—Donovan Resigns His Position.

"Charlie" Gorman, North America's premier speed skater, is not going to Moncton for June 7 to compete in the sprints for the final Olympic tryouts for Maritime aspirants. Gorman was not selected to train by the committee, and his friends have been urging him to get into training by himself and try to duplicate his performance of last year of running the 100 yards in 10 1/2 seconds.

"While I feel I could make a good showing at Moncton," said Gorman, recently, "I do not care just at the present to ask for time away from my work. If I went to Moncton it would mean additional time away from my job. I have not had any too much during the last few years, and having got a position now, I intend to look after it. It means more to me than athletic honors."

Taking time off from work for athletic events is bound to interfere sooner or later with plans of the employer, and in this connection, Louis Donovan, Maritime featherweight champion, has been compelled to resign his position in order to get himself into the best possible shape for the final trials here on June 4 and 5.

In bringing boxing honors to St. John, the youngster has been asking for considerable time off, and affairs have come to a point where, in justice to his employers, Donovan gave up his work. If Donovan should win here, he will be sent to Toronto for the final Olympic tryouts, and this would mean several more weeks away from work.

OUT LOU BOGASH

First Time the Latter was Ever Knocked Off His Feet.

LIFE STORY OF
COLORED BOXER

Says Ring Success is Due to Prayer and to His Manager.

The short life-story of Battling McCreary, the Boston holder of the world's light-heavy title, reads like a page from one of London's books of wild adventure, says the Boston Post. Born 27 years ago in the jungle land of Liberia, Africa, McCreary early in life attracted the attention and won the friendship of James Henry McCrory, an English hunter and traveler. When the latter returned to Britain, he took McCreary, to whom he had given his name, with him.

But McCreary could not bring himself to settle in England for all time. Hearing of the States he finally boarded a boat bound for America and eventually landed in Florida. After 10 years of struggle, working at all trades, but mostly as a sailor and longshoreman, the Battler made his way to Boston, took to the fight game and eventually under the tutelage of Alex. MacLean, one-time pilot of Jack Johnson, defeated Kid Norfolk of New York for the colored 175-pound title.

A fierce warrior in the ring, a game, tough, hard puncher that few care to encounter, outside the ropes the big fellow is as gentle as a child. He is a Sunday school teacher at the Zion Methodist church in Columbus avenue, a Christian Endeavor worker, and so soft-spoken and quiet that few would pick him as the man to challenge Tunney, Siki, Carpenter and Willis, none of whom will take a chance with him.

McCreary credits his successes in the ring, first of all to prayer, the clean, Christian life that he aims to live, and his manager, MacLean.
