Predicts Big Beef Export Trade Via St. Lawrence River

TASCHEREAU OUT FOR NEW MARKETS

Beland Blames Conservatives for Leaving Canada Debt Heritage.

QUEBEC, May 17.—At a banquet given in his honor on Saturday night by the Young Liberal Association, Hon. Dr. Henri S. Beland, Minister of Health and Soldiers' Civil Re-establishment, expressed it as his opinion that where the Conservative government had left the country in a heritage of debt because of its maladministration the Liberal government had immediately set to work to remedy this state of affairs when given power in 1921.

The public expenditure had been reduced from \$600,000,000 in 1921, to \$366,000,000 in 1924, he said. The public debt had been reduced by \$3,000,000, and the number of civil servants had been reduced from 42,000 to 38,000, affecting a saving of \$500,000 a year. Indirect taxes had been reduced by \$30,000,000 added Dr. Beland.

TASCHEREAU APPLAUDS.

Premier Taschereau was applauded for five minutes when he rose to speak after Dr. Beland. The Premier asked that Ottawa keep out of the proposed Ontario railway project and leave the rich mining fields here, developed at a cost of \$4,000,000, to the old province of Quebec. He asked for new markets for the farmers and national lines for farmers in Gaspe and Lake St. John, who, he said, had waited long years for the coming of the railway.

SPECIMENS ADD TO FOSSIL COLLECTION

Old Volumes and Copy of Remarkable Paintings Among Museum Gifts.

From the remote ends of the earth and from the home town are gathered together the various articles which are received as gifts at the Natural History Society. They comprise things both ancient and modern.

Recent donations have been of special interest. A Stewart Smith has presented a good collection of English fossils found in the chalk country or in flint. Among them are specimens of sea urchins and sponge-like forms. The museum collection of fossils is one of considerable repute and these latest additions are very welcome.

Mr. Smith has also presented a specimen of the basket insect from Argentina which is now inanimate form. His other gifts include five specimens of dried potatoes from Peru where they are ground and used as flour. The dried specimen is about the size of a small plum.

OLD BELL TOWER.

A piece of lava from the Highlands of Scotland, and satin spar from Niagara Falls round out the assortment of gifts. Mr. Smith donated to the Society.

E. H. Milson, of Harding street, has presented a photograph of the old bell tower which once stood at the head of King street and which was destroyed in the great fire of 1877.

GIVES OLD BOOKS.

From Miss Louise Symonds the society has received three rare old volumes which would delight the hearts of connoisseurs and bibliophiles. One volume is the Iliad of Homer, printed in London in 1789. The other two volumes are part of a set of four with the title, "An historical account of all the voyages around the world performed by English navigators." These volumes were published in London in 1775.

MARVELOUS PAINTING.

Mrs. W. Edmond Raymond has given a reproduction of the wonderful head of Christ, painted by Gabriel Max, on Veronica's handkerchief. The painting is considered almost supernatural because as one looks upon the eyes of Christ they are seen to slowly follow it if they were intent to pierce the very heart.

ANOTHER INDUSTRY

Canning Plant at Water Street and South Wharf—Twenty Men at Start.

A new industry to can New Brunswick vegetables, fruits and possibly meats will be started in Saint John in a short time, it was announced last night. The company behind the project is known as the O'Connor Manufacturing Company, Limited, with Lewis Connors as provisional president and Arthur Anglin and Gerald Anglin as provisional directors.

The company's plant will be located at the corner of Water street and South Wharf in the building formerly occupied by Mr. Connors. It is planned to have the machinery in working order early enough to handle this year's crop. It is possible that the premises will be enlarged later to take in the adjoining building.

About 20 men, it is expected, will be employed at the start of the work and this number will probably be increased as the plant grows.

STONEY INDIANS PREPARE FOR CELEBRATION



These are Tachantoga or Stoney Mountain Indians—"people of the woods". Time was when they were a blood-thirsty lot, with a partially for white men's scalps and an unpleasant habit of slaying anybody they did not happen to approve of. But look at them now. Their war-like glory has departed and they realize that the white-man is not such a bad sort of chap after all. Big Chief Powderface is as friendly as a Rotary president, and he and his six hundred braves come over every year to Banff, all decked out in their gala attire, and celebrate the burning of the hatchet by a two-day carnival and Pow-wow.

The occasion is called an "Indian Day and Pow-wow" and consists of a series of parades, sports and encampment scenes and events. It always takes place on the third Monday and Tuesday in July, falling this year on the 23rd and 24th.

The individual in the insert is not, and never was, blood-thirsty nor fond of scalps. It is the Duke of Connaught in his regalia as an Honorary Chief of the Stoney Mountain Tribe. The picture was taken on the occasion of His Excellency's visit to the Rockies when he was Governor-General of Canada during the war.

This year's Pow-wow and Indian Day will be the thirty-third since its inauguration. After the field events, the members of the Tribe meet in the yard of the Banff Springs Hotel for the distribution of prizes. The big picture above depicts the scene which usually follows the prize distribution.

M. P. DIES AFTER CRANKING AUTO

T. H. Thompson Was Ill For Less Than Day—Elected to House in 1917.

BELLELEVILLE, Ont., May 17.—Thomas H. Thompson, member of parliament for Hastings (East) died suddenly at his home in Madoc this morning following an acute illness of less than a day. He was 58 years of age.

Physicians who attended Mr. Thompson stated that his death was caused by a combination of heart trouble, acute indigestion and congestion of the lungs. He collapsed early Saturday morning shortly after cranking his automobile and it is believed that he had strained his heart. He regained strength during the day, but towards midnight he became very weak and died about five hours later.
