About half-past eleven last Friday night, as three freight trains were following each other closely up the Hum-ber grade, near Toronto, a coupling broke between two of the cars in the first train. The fireman of No. 1 imediately ran back and signalled No. 2 to reverse, which the driver succeeded in doing, the engine coming to a stand-still a few feet from the rear of the first train. Train No. 3 came thundering along then, and, being ignorant of the state of affairs in front, the fireman and engineer had but time to jump when the noine dashed into No. 2, shattering to pieces a number of the cars in the rear, and throwing some of the others off the rails. The engineer, George Owens, was badly cut about the head, while the fireman had his nose broken and was otherwise injured about the head and shoulders. They were conveyed in vehicles to the city and their injuries at once attended to. The engine attached to the third train was badly battered, the cylinder, smoke stack, and pilot smashed out of shape. 
