INGERSOLL MEN SECOND AND THIRD

Will Law, of Tillsonburg, Won Oxford Marathon at Woodstock

Forty runners started in the 10-mile Oxford Marathon race yesterday at Woodstock. Will Law, of Tillsonburg, finished first in 1 hour, 1 minute and 24 seconds, beating Wade, of Ingersoll, who finished second, in the last few yards. "Bud" Kelly, of Ingersoll, finished third. Ingersoll runners have won the race two years out of the three it has been run. In 1906 Leslie Daniels finished first and last year Garnet Elliott won. Many Ingersoll people saw the race yesterday and were anxious to see one of the local runners capture the coveted cup. Wade, second, and Kelly, third, is conclusive evidence that those "in the know" were justified in expecting an Ingersoll runner to finish first.

Wade is a Scotchman, who has resided in Ingersoll about one year. He is employed at the Noxon foundry. "Bud" Kelly is well known in town. He was a valuable wing man on the intermediate hockey team last winter.

Frank Kay, another Ingersoll runner, finished tenth. Kay is only fourteen years old, and his admirers were delighted with the splendid showing he made.

It is estimated that five thousand people saw the athletic events which took place at the W.A.A.A. grounds. Bobby Kerr was the star attraction of the afternoon, and he did not merely give exhibitions of his wonderful speed, but was a competitor in the open sprints, which he won in his accustomed finished style.

PONZI SENTENCED TO 30 MONTHS

Italian Who Hit Fellow Country-Man on Head With Stone Will Go To Penitentiary.

About one o'clock this afternoon, Justice Magee, presiding judge at the high court being held at Woodstock, sentenced P. Ponzi, the Italian to two years and six months in the Kingston penitentiary for manslaughter. It will be remembered that Ponzi, who was sent for trial from Ingersoll on a charge of murder for hitting a fellow-countryman on the head with a stone, causing his death, was found guilty of manslaughter by the jury on Thursday and sentence was deferred until later in the week.

M. K. Cowan for the Railway Says Gates and Watchmen are Necessary.

In reporting the sitting of the Dominion Railway Commission, now going on in Toronto, The World has the following:

A second postponement was granted the Town of Ingersoll in its objection of G. T. Blackstock, K.C., their counsel, in their application for an order directing the Grand Trunk Railway to provide gates and day and night watchmen at the Thames street crossing. M. K. Cowan for the railway company agreed that gates and two watchmen were necessary at this point; but did not approve of a rearrangement of the railway tracks to allow for the removal of the north switch.

THE POWER LINE

SURVEYING PARTY HAVE COMPLETED THEIR WORK TO LONDON.

London, Nov. 11--Mr. Harry Marshall, employed on one of the surveying parties for the hydro-electric power commission, returned to Niagara Falls last evening. His party have completed the surveying of the line to London, and according to the survey the line will enter London near Graham's Hotel on the Hamilton road.
