WHERE LOVE LAUGHED

KNOT WAS TIED THROUGH CELL'S BARRED WINDOW.

Cripple Creek, Col., July 28.—A marriage at the county jail took place under unusual circumstances last night when Prof. Hans Albert, a musician, formerly of Omaha, and Miss Grace Haddell of Ottumwa, Iowa, daughter of the United States Marshal at that place, were declared man and wife by the Rev. Mr. Inman, a Methodist minister of Goldfield, Col. Albert's arrest was caused Saturday by the girl's father to prevent the marriage, the charge being insanity. Last night Miss Haddell and the minister visited the jail and asked to see Albert. The request was refused, and the jailer, thinking the incident would not be of any benefit, refused to let them see him. The girl's father, however, placed outside Albert's cell window, Miss Haddell mounted it and clasping Albert's hand through the barred window was made his wife.

GAVE BIRTH TO TRIPLETS

OCCASION CELEBRATED IN GREAT STYLE IN LACHINE HOUSE.

Montreal, July 28.—Mrs. Bertrand Lachine gave birth to triplets yesterday. All three are hale and hearty. She has been married six years, and has seven children. The house was decorated to-day in honor of the event, and all and sundry were made welcome.

REFUSE AMBULANCE

Doctor Would Not Take Dying Man to Hospital.

COULD HAVE SAVED LIFE

Declaring Patient Was Drunk Montreal Physician Obstinate Refused to Take Victor Grey, a Stockbroker Who Had Taken Poison, to Hospital—Victim's Doctor Takes Him In a Carriage.

Montreal, July 30.—It has developed that Victor Grey, who died Tuesday night, committed suicide. He rang up a friend and said good-bye and then took a dose of chloral.

Grey was a prominent stockbroker and the occurrence has created somewhat of a sensation, apart from the manner of his death.

Grey, who had resided at the Crompton Hotel, called one of the attendants and asked him to bring a doctor, saying he was very ill. Dr. Alexander Munro was immediately called, and he stated that Grey was suffering from narcotic poisoning, and telephoned for the Royal Victoria ambulance.

When the ambulance arrived the doctor in charge examined Mr. Grey and said that he was drunk, refusing to take him to the hospital. Dr. Munro argued and said that it was a matter of life and death, but the ambulance doctor was obstinate and refused to take the man. Finally Dr. Munro had him driven to the hospital in a cab, and he was admitted to the ward. In spite of all the doctors could do, he died an hour later.

Dr. Munro said yesterday that Mr. Grey's life could probably have been saved if he had been taken to the hospital when he first called the ambulance.

Mr. Grey was married only a few months ago to Miss Honor Clayton of Ottawa.

LESLIE REPLACED.

Toronto Exhibition Treasurership Goes to Frank Brentnall.

Toronto, July 30.—The appointment of Frank F. Brentnall, cashier in the inland department of the Industrial Exhibition Board, succeeding Col. J. K. Leslie, resigned, will probably be made at a special meeting of the directors to be held in the exhibition board room at 4 o'clock this afternoon.

Col. Leslie's letter of resignation was, it is learned, received at a private meeting of the executive committee yesterday afternoon. Under the circumstances the committee considered that only one course was open to them, and it was agreed that the resignation should be accepted. The shortage is now shown to be \$8,000.

Syndicate After Newspapers.

Montreal, July 30.—It is said a syndicate of interests are about to take up The St. John Telegraph and Times, with a view to enlarge and improve them. The close proximity of the general elections and reports that Liberals were trying to secure the papers, have, it is said, induced certain people to step in with the view to securing journalistic influence in New Brunswick. John McLean is a present in Montreal. While he admits that negotiations are going on, he is reluctant to reveal any knowledge.

BULLET LODGED NEAR LEFT EYE

Dereham Lad Seriously Wounded By The Accidental Discharge of Rifle

By the accidental discharge of a 22-calibre rifle in the hands of his brother, Sydney Huxcock, the 8-year-old son of Mr. J. Huxcock, Dereham, of the 2nd Concession of Dereham, yesterday afternoon received a bullet in the head, and while not fatally wounded, his condition is serious.

The bullet entered the head an inch and a half behind the left ear, traversed the parietal bone, injuring the facial nerve and producing paralysis on the left side of the face. The bullet lodged in the deep muscles of the face near the left eye.

The injured lad spent a comfortable night and today was doing as well as could be expected.

The accident happened on the farm of Mr. J. Huxcock, one of the two boys, between five and six o'clock in the afternoon. The lads found the rifle in the house, and it was while it was being handled that it was accidentally discharged.

An Ingersoll physician was summoned and arrived within half an hour from the time the accident occurred.

Desertion May Be Charged. Belleville, July 30.—Two members of the 16th Regiment of Prince Edward, who went to Quebec with their regiments, then left for home because conditions did not suit them, may be tried for desertion. They are Privates Frazer and Reeves. Col. Young of Kingston is said to be moving in the matter. The men, if found guilty, are liable to three months' imprisonment. They say they did not know they were doing wrong, as they had not signed the service roll.

Throws Man Overboard. Kenora, July 30.—During an altercation on Monday afternoon on board the steamer Standard, a work boat of Sutton & McArthur, a Swedish foreman in their employ, threw overboard a young Scotchman named Robert McKay. All means were taken to rescue him, but without avail, and during the excitement that followed the Swede disappeared. A search for the murderer has been instituted.

Another Northern Eldorado. Port Arthur, July 30.—Stories of great mineral wealth in the Sturgeon Lake country are brought in by T. S. Crowley of Peterboro, who brings rich samples of gold, silver and nickel. Mr. Crowley also claims to have uncovered a vein thirty feet wide of nickel in almost its pure state at a point north of the Transcontinental and about one hundred miles west of here.

Ottawa, July 29.—Dr. Wm. Saunders of Ottawa, Director of Dominion Experimental Farms, states that the grain crops of the Ottawa Valley will as a whole be hardly up to the average, although as a result of recent rains the prospects are much better than they were early in the month. The root and hay crops are reported to be fairly satisfactory.

TO JAIL FOR DOG

WHAT TORONTO MAN WAS PREPARED TO DO FOR PETS.

Toronto, July 30.—Rather than see his cocker spaniel killed, John Busby, an Englishman living at Brant place, was quite prepared to pay five dollars and go down for ten days. The court did not intend anything so drastic as that, the Englishman having omitted to notice the "or" in the sentence of Magistrate Patterson. He was overjoyed to hear that all he would have to do to save his dog's life was to pay five dollars.

He would gladly pay that several times over for those two dogs, he said. The case arose out of a desire of the court that one of Busby's dogs should be destroyed because it was alleged that it had bitten a little girl named Jessie Stone. An adjournment was secured from Monday because the court did not know which of the two dogs to execute, the two spaniels being exactly alike. Yesterday Busby brought the two dogs into court, and after Magistrate Patterson had examined them he admitted that he would not know them apart, and that they did not bear the appearance of very ferocious animals. Finally an arrangement was arrived at whereby Busby sends his pet, and the little girl gets \$4 of the fine to help her recover from the bite.

LONDON OLD BOYS

FULL ATTENDANCE REQUESTED AT FINAL MEETING SATURDAY NIGHT.

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WITHOUT TURNING OFF THE WATER

Twelve Inch Main Tapped at the Corner of Wingham and King Streets

The Ingersoll Waterworks Co., assisted by two workmen from London with the necessary appliances, tapped the 12-inch main at the corner of King and Wingham streets this afternoon, without turning off the water. This is the first time in the history of the local waterworks company that mains have been tapped without turning off the water for some time. The company is to be commended for their action in getting the assistance of the London Water Commissioners. If this had not been done, it would have been necessary to shut off the water for some time to make the connection. As the 12-inch main on King street feeds all the mains in town, shutting it off would have meant the putting out of commission of the whole service. The tapping of the main was made necessary on account of the laying of an 8-inch main on Wingham street for an additional hydrant at the corner of Charles and Wingham streets.
