## Bale Verte Canal.

INTENDING Contractors are hereby informed  
that about January next, Tenders will be re-  
ceived for the works connected with the construc-  
tion of what is called the BALE VERTE CANAL,  
to connect the Bay of Fundy and the Gulf of St.  
Lawrence.

Commencing near the outlet of the River Au  
Lac, the line follows in a South Easterly direction  
to a point between Tongue's Island and Fort  
Cumberland; then in a nearly direct curve along  
the valley of the Missisquoi to a place between  
Hacmatack Lake, and Miner's Point; thence  
curving round still further to the South  
East to the Main Line of the Tidnish River, near  
Chapell's Farm, where it takes a North Easterly  
direction to near the mouth of the river, and then  
crosses Tidnish Head in an Easterly course to  
deep water in Bale Verte.

The works will be divided into Sections suited  
to circumstances and the locality.  
The outline of the route above indicated will  
enable Contractors to examine the dry portions of  
the line before winter sets in, and those parts  
through bogs after the ground is sufficiently frozen.  
To facilitate this examination, a Lithographic  
map of the locality will be furnished on applica-  
tion by letter, or otherwise to this office.

When plans, specifications, and other docu-  
ments are prepared, due notice will be given;  
Contractors will then have an opportunity of ex-

ON the recommendation of the Honorable the  
Minister of Customs, and under the provi-  
sions of the 4th Section of the Act passed in  
the Session of the Parliament of Canada, held in  
the 31st year of Her Majesty's Reign, chapter  
5, and intitled "An Act respecting the Customs"  
His Excellency, by and with the advice of the  
Queen's Privy Council of Canada, has been pleased  
to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the  
following item in Schedule C of Customs Tariff  
Act as amended by the Act 37 Vic. cap. 6, viz:—  
"Woods unmanufactured when chiefly used in  
dyeing" be and the same is hereby declared to be  
intended to apply to "Woods" used for the pur-  
poses mentioned in the said item, which may be  
imported free when simply ground or chipped as  
well as in solid pieces or sticks, such grinding  
and chipping not being considered such a manu-  
facturing as would take the article out of the ex-  
emption.

And it is further ordered, under the authority  
aforesaid, that the item "Ratan for chair makers"  
mentioned in the said list of free goods (Schedule  
C) be, and the same is hereby declared to be,  
intended to cover Ratan imported for a ship manu-  
factures.
