Halifax, N. S., March 3.—The local government held two protracted meetings yesterday and today. It is said that the two meetings were wrangling, and that the government was divided and falling to pieces. The remains of the late John S. Dunn were interred in the Methodist burial ground Saturday afternoon. Rev. Mr. Shenton conducted services at the residence of the deceased and at the grave. A large number of people attended, and deputations from the Knights of Pythias walked in the procession. Among the very beautiful flowers sent was a shield of blue, yellow and red, composed of violets, daffodils and scarlet carnations, upon an ivy base, from Union Lodge, K. of P., of which the deceased was a member, and a crescent of cream and white roses from the Central telephone office. The pall-bearers were James Paul, F. S. Skinner, Wm. Mowatt, Thomas Kee, J. S. Knowles and Hugh McCavoun.

The funeral of the late George W. Whitney took place on Saturday afternoon upon the arrival of the C. P. R. express from Montreal. The remains were taken to Trinity church, where Ven. Archdeacon Brigstocke, assisted by Rev. Wm. Balouch, conducted the burial service. The choir of Trinity sang the hymn The Saints of God, Their Conflicts Past. There were no pall-bearers. The members of St. George's society—many of the other residents of the city and a number of the employees of J. & A. McMillan—attended the funeral. Mr. Whitney's remains were interred in the Rural cemetery alongside the body of his wife, who died some five or six years ago. In Trinity church on Sunday morning, at the close of the service, the rector said that Mr. Whitney was one of the delegates of Trinity who met him twenty miles from the city when he came here in 1873 to assume the rectorship of the parish. Miss Whitney and her friend, Miss Phillips, accompanied Mr. Whitney's remains to St. John. Miss Phillips returned by Saturday's express, and Miss Whitney, who is now at the Clifton, will leave for Montreal this afternoon.
