WON'T PUT DUTY ON PULP EXPORTS

Canada Plans to Move to Stop Outflow of Pulp if U. S. Admits It Free.

WASHINGTON, April 23.—The strongest argument of the opponents of the free listing of wood pulp and print paper is put out of commission before the real struggle begins, by advice received in this city from a high official source in Canada.

It is stated on high authority that Sir Wilfrid Laurier and his Government are anxious to see President Roosevelt's recommendation of free wood pulp adopted in the United States. In view of the pending elections in Canada, he believes such a course on the part of the United States would relieve the Government of embarrassing attacks, both from the forest interests and the paper manufacturers.

The opposition of the Canadian Government to any export duty is accentuated by bitter local feeling. In three provinces, where most of the wood for the manufacture of paper comes, the population has suffered for years a constant drain into the great undeveloped stretches of the northwest, with a corresponding reduction in their parliamentary representation. The English-speaking population of the three provinces is particularly resentful of this change, as the Government power is being shifted to the English-speaking settlers of the western provinces.

The remedy they have decided on is the opening up of their own heavy forests to settlement to offset the great opening in the newer provinces to the west. In this work the sale of the wood is an invaluable element. The manufacturers of paper from the bulk of the purchasers of this wood.

On the other hand the paper manufacturers believe that the opening of the American paper market would relieve them of the danger of a lack of raw material. Ample protection in their home market by an import duty of ten per cent on paper, they are afraid only that the American manufacturers will begin to buy the wood of the spruce and cedar used in the manufacture of paper from the great forests in Quebec, Ontario and New Brunswick.

The individual manufacturer levy a duty on anything except the product from the lands of the crown, the public lands under the direct control of that province. In the woodlands at issue in the three provinces only about one-sixth of the land is under the crown. The remainder has been alienated and the wood from that is subject to no tax.

EXPLOSION DESTROYED LARGE DYEING PLANT
Damage to the extent of \$150,000 Done at Chester Works.

CHESTER, Pa., April 23.—Fire caused by the combustion of dust destroyed the shipping and extracting department of the Sharples Dye Wood Company's plant today injuring a score of workmen, several of them dangerously, and entailing a loss estimated at \$150,000. The explosion blew off the roof of the building and George Miller, assistant chemist, was hurled down stairs and seriously injured. George Harris, colored, was blown through the roof and perhaps fatally hurt, and other workmen were tossed about, cut, bruised and burned.

HIS SECOND TRIAL ON CHARGE OF MURDER
BOULDER, Colo., April 23.—The second trial of F. E. Kiser for murder, growing out of the destruction of Colorado and Southern station here by dynamite during the jury returned a verdict of second degree murder. The minimum penalty is ten years in the penitentiary.

NICARAGUAN TROOPS FOUGHT WITH INDIANS
NEW ORLEANS, April 23.—Passengers who arrived yesterday from Bluefields and Nicaragua, reported that the fighting between Mosquito Indians and Nicaraguans has ended with the killing of the Indian chief. The fighting began two months ago and a large number of persons were reported to have been killed. Yesterday's reports, however, were that not more than a dozen lives were lost.
