COULD HEAR THE MOANS OF DYING RUSSIANS!

Admiral Togo Sends a Graphic Account of the Fight Outside Port Arthur—Marakoff Acted Most Heroically.

TOKIO, March 13.—Official and private reports both indicate that Vice-Admiral Togo's fourth attack on Port Arthur on the tenth instant, was the most effective since the first assault on a month ago.

The closing action was the bombardment of the inner harbor by the Japanese battleships. The latter took a position southwest of Port Arthur and used only 12-inch guns.

The latest reports place the Japanese loss at 3 killed, 5 seriously wounded and 17 slightly hurt.

What the manufacture of wire nails began in the United States it soon became apparent that the nail industry would be revolutionized.
