CIVIL WAR IN CAGCASUS ADDS TO CZAR'S DANGER

ANOTHER OFFICIAL MURDERED. WARSAW, Russian Poland, July 30.—M. Buraco, the leading official of the Sochatchev district, and a policeman who was escorting him, were shot dead by revolutionists near here today in revenge for the part they had taken in the repression of the agrarian strike movement.

SOLDIER DEFIES BISHOP IN CHURCH. ODESSA, July 30.—A common soldier caused a remarkable sensation in the Cathedral here today by arising in the body of the church during service and contradicting certain political statements of the archbishop uttered from the pulpit.

NOT YET, BUT—WASHINGTON, July 30.—Ambassador Meyer at St. Petersburg sent a dispatch to the state department today in which he reviews the situation in Russia and says there seems to be no probability of a general strike of laborers at this time.

ODessa, July 30.—The police, today, arrested fifty employes of the custom house who were on strike.

MOSCOW, July 30.—A strike has broken out here among the bankers, who are striving to obtain a betterment in their working condition and Sunday for a day of rest.

CHICAGO, July 29.—The mysterious disappearance of a Chicago dog, whose license number was 18,696, has been solved, but the identity of the owner, despite widespread inquiry by reporters, remains a subject of doubt.

DUMA MEMBERS PROSECUTED

Gov't Charges Them With Treason

Revolutionists Issue Manifesto Calling on the People to Arise and Overthrow the Government

ST. PETERSBURG, July 30.—The public prosecutor has started proceedings against the members of the lower house of parliament who signed the Viborg manifesto.

IT is understood that arrested members will be admitted to bail pending trial. The Constitutional Democrats are chiefly apprehensive that the possibility of prosecution held over the heads of their leaders will render them ineligible for re-election in the same manner that Professor Milukoff and M. Hosen and others were excluded from the last lower house.

The motive of the government for abandoning its attitude not to prosecute the signers of the Viborg manifesto is set forth recently by Premier Stolypin in an interview. He stated, but evidently it was understood, by the need of doing something to counteract the effect of the Viborg address. This has attained an enormous circulation in the provinces, in spite of the greatest efforts on the part of the administration to prevent its publication.
