High Sheriff Has Narrow Escape In Collision With Train

—Mr. John B. Bellefleur, High Sheriff of Madawaska County, had a very narrow escape from death when the Dodge Coupe in which he was driving, collided with the C. P. R. freight train at St. Basile on Friday evening last.

At about 8.15 P.M., Mr. Bellefleur was proceeding to St. Basile to visit his children in the convent there, where the children have been staying since the recent death of their mother, and just as he was going over the first crossing on the Edmundston side of St. Basile he was struck by the C. P. R. freight train which was going toward Edmundston. The train struck the car almost in the center but enough toward the rear to knock it to the left side of the track. As it did so it caused the right door to open and Mr. Bellefleur jumped out. The left rear wheel of the car was broken and the car veered against the train again. It was dragged a few feet before the train stopped. The car is a total wreck but Mr. Bellefleur escaped with only slight bruises on the nose and one arm and leg.

Eye witnesses say that the engine of the train did not have a proper headlight, as a clear view of the track can be had two or three hundred feet before the crossing is reached and if the engine had had a bright headlight the driver of the car would have seen it and the accident would have been averted. A car a short distance in the rear of Mr. Bellefleur driven by Mr. Bedford almost hit the train even after the first collision as he did not see any light on the track either.

Electrical Sup. Engaged By Town Council

At a recent meeting the Town Council of Edmundston met Mr. H. S. Franklin of Ottawa and engaged him as electrical superintendent of the Town for six months at a salary of \$200.00 per month, the salary to be raised to \$250.00 if his services are satisfactory and he is to be hired for a longer period.

This is to fill the position formerly held by Mr. H. E. Macmen who received a salary of \$200 per month when his services were dispensed with in April. Since that time the chairman of the electrical committee has been looking after the electrical affairs of the Town.

Mr. Franklin although a young man has had considerable experience in the designing, construction and operating of power plants and distribution systems with the Fraser Brace Co., Alabama Power Co., Brooklyn Edison Co., and the Gaietue Power Company, having been employed by the last named company for the past four and a half years doing work very similar to that which he will be required to do here, and has been very highly recommended by that Company. He will not be able to undertake his duties until the latter part of October, but has arranged to send a competent man in the meantime if required by the Town.

New Covered Skating Rink For Edmundston Now Assured.

Several meetings have been held recently by The Bachelor Club, the Town Council and the School Board and now final arrangements have been made for the erection of a covered skating rink on part of the land owned by the School Board and situated at the corner of Rice and School Streets.

The land on which the rink is to be built is to be leased to the Bachelor Club in return for the privilege of the school children using the rink four afternoons, from 4.00 to 5.30 o'clock and Saturday morning from 9.30 to 11.30 each week, from December 1st to March 15th free of charge.

The Town is to guarantee the bonds of the Bachelor Club to the extent of \$20,000.00, the amount to be secured by a first mortgage on the rink and payment of the bonds to be provided for by a sinking fund.

The rink is to be owned and managed by the Bachelor Club which is to have a Board of seven Directors, one appointed by the School Board, three by the Town Council and three by the shareholders of the Bachelor Club.

When the bonds of the Club have all been paid off or a sufficiently large sinking fund to pay the bonds at maturity established the Bachelor Club is to convey their interest in the rink to the Town and the Town is to lease it to the Club at a nominal rental if the Club desires it.

Before the Town Council approved of the proposition, a petition asking them to do so was presented to them. This petition was signed by 169 representing a considerable proportion of the assessed valuation of the Town.

The Town Council has named Joseph Pelletier, Thaddeé Martin and T. M. Richards as their representatives on the Board of Directors of the Bachelor Club, and it is expected that Denis Martin will represent the School Board.

The rink will meet a long felt need and if the people give the management proper support in their endeavors there should be no difficulty in their taking care of the sinking fund and interest requirements.

The Bachelor Club is composed of a group of young men who have for several seasons supported sport in the Town and if anyone can make a success of a rink they should be able to do so.

Presidency Goes To M. D. Cormier

ONE GOOD RECIPE FOR A COOK FAMOUS

MAKES

Following is a salad that is substantial enough for a main course and easily prepared. It is particularly adaptable for the late Sunday supper: 2 cups of tongue, ham or veal, 1 cup chopped celery or string beans, 3 hard cooked eggs, chopped; 1 cup canned green lima beans, ¼ cup of gherkins, chopped; French dressing and some Mayonnaise of cooked salad dressing. Mix all the ingredients. Marinate with French dressing. Moisten well with mayonnaise or cooked salad dressing. Serve on lettuce leaves on individual plates.

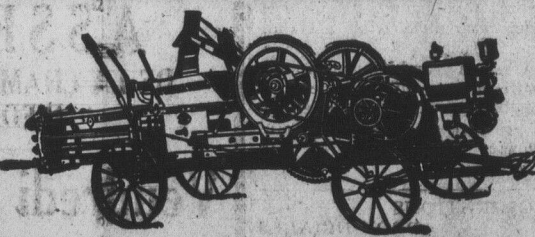
