MANAGER MACK WILL STAND PAT ON HIS WORLD-BEATERS

Elongated Leader of Athletics Feels Confident That His Team will Retain the Championship—Will Make but Few Changes in the Line-Up—Trying to Bolster Up Outfield.

The Philadelphia Athletics will enter the American league championship race this year with almost the same team that won the pennant last year and capped the victory by beating the Chicago Cubs in the world's series. Manager Connie Mack is authority for the statement but it is not certain that all the players who helped bring the American league title to Philadelphia will be retained by the club plot of the champions during the coming season who would go.

Manager Mack has almost forty players on his list and plans to take about thirty-two on the southern training trip. Several players who were not selected upon who would go, will not doubt be let out and Manager Mack may decide on these men shortly. The pick of the surplus stock on the Athletics list will be to build more to build up Jack Dunn's Eastern league team, which lost several of its best men by draft and purchase last season.

Just who will go from the Athletics has not yet been announced, and Manager Mack has declared that he had not settled upon who would go.

May Have New Outfield.

If there is any change made in the Athletics, it will be in the outfield. Danny Murphy is sure to be found in his old position in right field, but there is a question who will get the steady jobs in center and left. Last season Oidring, Lord, Strunk and Hartel were played, and the four men will be taken south this spring.

Oidring is certain to be retained, and Amos Strunk is well liked by Manager Mack on account of his great speed and base-running ability. Strunk was unable to play the greater part of last season owing to an injured leg, but in the 16 games he played he batted for an average of .333, and Manager Mack thought so well of the youngster that he used him in the world's series in preference to the veteran Hartel. Strunk was forced to lay off on account of an injury to his leg.

If Strunk's leg will stand the training and season, he will likely be played in center, and Oidring will go to left. This will give the Athletics hard hitting outfield, and Oidring and Strunk ought to hold their ends up in the base-running line. This will leave Hartel and Lord as substitutes along with whoever Mack selects from his list of recruits.

Connie Mack secured Briscoe Lord from Cleveland last season in exchange for Ratt. Mack has declared that he has not announced any changes in his team.

Teams Have Been Strengthened.

Several of the eastern league teams have been greatly strengthened for the coming season with recruits turned over by the major league and Jack Dunn is counting on Connie Mack turning over a few players to help him enter the fight with a fair chance of keeping the Orioles in the race. He is fortunate in being a very tough little fellow who can be at his best at the lightweight limit. He is built for the long distance.

After seeing Wolgast work twice with Brown it can be safely said that he will never be a popular champion. He does not possess any of the qualities that have made real champions. His work in the ring is not pleasant to look at.

Wolgast claims to have hurt his right arm in his fight at the National Hockey Association last night, and Friday night. According to the whole sale way in which he breaks his arms it would pay him to hire a surgeon by the year to row him around the country.


OTTAWA SHUTS OUT CANADIENS.

VICS WILL NOT PLAY IN BOSTON

After working in vain for two days the Moncton pro hockey team management announced last evening that the proposed Boston trip was off. It was impossible for the Moncton team to get dates in the Boston arena next week as it was first arranged. Art Ross and his bunch of brave warriors from Montreal put the brush to the whole thing. Ross, probably thought that the champion Victorias would agree to anything he suggested and that the Victorias would go to Boston for anything, no matter how small it was. But he made the greatest mistake of his life when he tried to lay it on too thick. As said before, everything was arranged for two games to be played in the Boston Arena on the 15th and 18th between the champion Victorias and the Montreal Wanderers for a purse of \$2,000, to be divided equally.

The Wanderers had dates in New York for next week which were deferred until the following week to accommodate the Moncton Victorias, and then all at once Ross wired the Boston Arena management that he could not play in Boston until March 23rd and 25th.

It appears very plainly that Ross was a little nervous about taking on the champion Victorias before the Wanderers played in New York in case he should run into a bunch of better hockey players than the ones that represent the Wanderers. It is a sure thing that if the Wanderers were beaten in Boston by the Moncton Victorias the Wanderers' trip to New York would be all off, because the people of New York would not want to see a winning aggregation not a defeated team.

The Moncton management feel confident that they could beat the Wanderers in a finish, in a May game. A large number of provincial people in Boston will regret to learn that the trip will not materialize, as the great interest was being taken in this coming sporting event. The interest that was being taken is shown in a telegram received from Dr. G. W. Tingley, who said that for the past two weeks over 150 telephone calls a day are received at the Boston Arena asking when the Moncton Victorias play in Boston.

Seeing that it was impossible for the team to play on the 23rd and 25th as it was too heavy an expense to the team together with that date the management decided that the team should disband, which went into effect last evening.

CHAMPION WALKER IN HALIFAX

George N. Brown of Auburn, New York, the world's champion toe and heel walker, from one mile to one hundred miles, will be in St. John's, N.B., very young to 16, the possessor of such a title. He is only 19, stands five feet, eight inches and a half in height, and weighs 135 pounds.

He has won numerous titles and says that walking is very strenuous work.

Brown says his most difficult race was in Peterborough last May when he won the world's record, before 2,000 people, for this occasion he defeated Hoagland, covering 125 miles in nineteen hours. Brown feels confident that he can lower this record. He says that he feels sure that he will improve a lot yet, and will soon break many records.

Brown is willing to meet anybody in the world in a walking race from one mile to one hundred miles, and he would like very much to try conclusions with some local walkers. Brown's best work for one mile is six minutes and thirty-one seconds. Halifax Herald.
