Late Gossip Of The Sporting World At Home And Abroad

EXCITING HORSE RACES ON MOOSEPATH YESTERDAY; NEWBRO AND VICTORIA THE WINNERS

There was a good attendance at the Moosepath Park track races yesterday afternoon, and those who were fortunate enough to be present witnessed one of the best meets seen on this track in years.

There were six starters in the 227 class for trotters only, and this event was won in three straight heats by Victoria, the mare from Sussex, although she was well chased out by Happy Ladd, the St. John gelding. Peter D, driven by Tommy Raymond, of Fredericton, captured third money, and every heat proved a horse race from start to finish.

The Free-for-All had three starters, James K. Newbro, driven by Tommy Raymond; Corwin Hal, driven by Sherron, and Coquette, driven by Peter D. This race took five heats to decide a winner, and there was not one of the heats that was not so close contested that it brought the spectators to their feet.

In the first heat of the Free-for-All James K. Newbro drew the pole, with Corwin Hal in second position and Coquette on the outside. On going to the first turn Corwin Hal forged ahead of John K and took the pole and down the back stretch it was a procession with the horses about length apart. Up the stretch to the half the horses were going steady and retained the same position. The half was done in ten. Going into the back stretch again John K closed up the gap on the leader, and at the three-quarter mark John K was in a position to win, but he was not to win terms with Corwin. It was indeed a pretty race between the two, coming into the home stretch Corwin Hal broke, but he caught quickly and managed to come along steady and went under the wire a winner of the heat with but half a length to the good over John K. The heat was trotted in 2:19 1/2.

The second heat proved another exciting race. The horses went into the back stretch with Corwin Hal a length ahead of John K, and Coquette about the same distance behind the latter. Going towards the quarter pole John K gained on the leader, and on the lower turn Corwin broke badly with the result that coming into the stretch John K captured the lead and before the black regained his feet he was also passed by Coquette. At the half John K was fully five lengths in the lead of the other horses.

On the back stretch to the three-quarter pole John K was well in the lead and taking matters easy. Coming into the home stretch Corwin was put under the whip, and while he passed Coquette and gained somewhat on John K, he could not reach near enough to the grey to make it a close finish. John K winning in a jog by about two lengths to the good. The heat was trotted in 2:22.

The third heat was started with Corwin Hal almost a length ahead of the pole horse, and when the horses reached the back stretch Corwin had a good lead over the other horses. At the quarter pole Corwin was a couple of lengths ahead of John K, who was in second position. On the lower turn Corwin Hal broke, but only for an instant and did not lose much ground. Coming up the stretch to the half John K gained considerably and was hardly a length behind the leader at the half, and when these horses reached the three-quarter mark John K was up on Corwin's wheels. Into the home stretch the horses came at a good clip and Corwin was seen to increase his lead and went under the wire two lengths ahead of John K, and won the heat in 2:19 1/2.

The fourth heat proved another surprise for the rail birds, as it was won by John K. The horses got a good send off, but on the first turn Corwin broke badly and John K evened up matters. Down the back stretch to the quarter pole these two horses were neck and neck, and it was as pretty a race as any person would wish to see, a blanket could easily cover the horses, and they were going as steady as a clock. GRAND CIRCUIT RACING

Cleveland, Aug. 16.—Lee Axworthy and William were crowned, respectively trotting and pacing kings today following two of the most sensational match races witnessed by the horse world in years, at the North Randall track.

Lee Axworthy battled three heats before defeating Peter Volo, while William won his race with Directum I in two straight heats. World's records took the count as a result of the afternoon's exhibition. Both matches were for purses of \$5,000.

In the first heat of the Axworthy-Volo contest, the latter trotted the mile in 2:02, tying the world's stallion mark held by The Harvester, and creating a new record for a four-year-old stallion. In the next two heats Axworthy won in 2:03 1/4 and 2:04 1/4, making an average time for a three-heat race, 2:03 1/4, a new world's record.

William, in the first heat of the pace, went around in 1:53 1/2, a new world's record for a five-year-old pacing stallion. His second heat, in 2:00, was another world's stallion record and his combined average time of 1:53 1/2 is a world mark for a five-year-old pacer. William also smashed the local track record of 2:01 1/4 and paced the fastest heat of 1915.
