COMMON COUNCIL'S SATURDAY SESSION

School Estimates Approved of—Power Company Asked to Take up One Track on Union Street—Other Business.

Mayor Hayes objected to the passing of the school estimates, on the ground that the council had no control over the expenditure, or no hand in the making of them, but on the advice of the common clerk the council approved of them at its meeting yesterday morning. The estimates of the public works department totalling \$120,467.38 were adopted, a motion calling on the New Brunswick Power Company to take up one of the tracks on Union street was passed, and Commissioner McLellan presented the market report. Mayor Hayes presided and all the commissioners were present.

Commissioner McLellan presented the report of the market department and this was received and ordered printing in the accounts and reports for the year.

A letter from N. B. Power Co. asking for a copy of report of B. A. MacIntyre who audited the books of the company for the city in order that they might check it, was filed.

Commissioner Fisher presented the estimates of the Public Works department. He pointed out that he kept the figures down to the same as last year. He promised to consider the argument of Commissioner Wigmore that the public works department should care for the cleaning of catch basins. The commissioner stated that he was considering the securing of a motor sweeper for the paved streets. Commissioner Wigmore urged the use of oil for dust calling on the Street Railway to remove one of their tracks on Union street was adopted.

No provision was made in the estimates for any paving on Main street. A motion by Commissioner Russell advocated the taking over by the public works department of North Market Street as a street.

Commissioner Russell presented the estimates of the School Board. Mayor Hayes objected to the passing of these estimates as the common council had nothing to say in the matter. The common clerk said the council must pass the estimates, and on motion they were agreed to.

The council will meet this morning to further consider estimates.

ANOTHER COLD SNAP.

Another cold snap struck the city Saturday night and yesterday just to remind the citizens that winter was still with us. The thermometer started to fall Saturday evening and reached the lowest reading shortly before nine o'clock yesterday morning when it registered nine below. At that hour it was four above. At nine o'clock last night the temperature was four below with prospects for a clear cold night. Yesterday was bright and clear with a slight breeze from the west and north-west.

THE POLICE COURT.

In the police court Saturday Henry Craft was remanded on the charge of being drunk and having liquor in his possession.

Bradford Mason and Arthur Peterson were charged with being drunk drinking in public, and having liquor in their possession, viz., lemon extract. They were remanded.

A boy was charged with stealing two new blankets valued at \$10.00 from the New Brunswick Telephone Company's barn in Peters' alley. He pleaded guilty and said that he sold the blankets for \$4.00 but refused to divulge the name of the person to whom the sale was made. He was remanded.

THISTLES DEFEAT ST. ANDREWS IN SECOND MATCH

Fourteen Rinks Aside Battle Afternoon and Night in Second Match of Series—The Grand Total Score Was: Thistles, 206; St. Andrews, 196.

This St. Andrew's curlers went down to defeat Saturday in their match with the Thistle Club, the total score being 206 to 196. This makes their second successive defeat at the hands of the Thistle curlers, they losing 14 points each time to their opponents. In the afternoon play on Thistle ice the home curlers won out by the comfortable majority of 12 points, but on St. Andrew's ice they lost 8 points, making a lead of 4 points for the total afternoon play.

On the Thistle ice in the evening the St. Andrew's curlers finished with a lead of 6 points, while their brother curlers on the St. Andrew's ice lost by 16 points, making a gain of 10 points for the Thistles.
