McGowan Again Won Skating Honors

St. Paul, Feb. 29.—Taking the first prize in three of the four senior events, E. McGowan, of St. Paul, today won the northwestern indoor amateur skating association's trophy with a total of 90 points. Charles Jewett and Joe Moore, of Lake Placid, tied for second place, with 60 points each. A. L. Louch, of Jersey City, N. J., was fifth with 50.

Miss Johnson, of Chicago, won the women's events with 60 points. In the quarter, Miss Johnson broke the world's record for women, making it in 45 seconds. She held the previous mark of 45 25 seconds.

BROSSEAU FIGHTS

Montreal, Feb. 29.—Eugene Brosseau, middleweight champion of Canada, left this city Saturday for Halifax, where he will meet Roddy McDonald on Tuesday night in a 15 round bout for the Canadian title.

Brosseau is invited to Halifax under the auspices of the Great War Veterans' Association, and is to receive \$1,500 and his expenses.

An arrangement was made Saturday by Captain Saunders, of the U. N. B. Basketball team, and the captain of the local Y. M. C. A. Seniors, whereby the date of the return match to be played by the college team has been set for Wednesday, March 10th.

Upper Canadian Hockey Gossip

Montreal, Feb. 29.—In a game that had no bearing on the championship and so lacking interest, the Canadiens on Saturday defeated Quebec by eight to six. Canadiens outplayed the Bulldogs in the first and final periods while Quebec carried off the honors in the second period by outscoring the locals four to three. In the opening twenty minutes Canadiens scored three times and shut out the visitors. The attendance was the smallest at any professional game this winter.

Fort William Won

Fort William, Ont., Feb. 29.—Fort William Maple Leafs, Thunder Bay district champions, defeated the Vics of Winnipeg in a fast game Saturday night six to three. The Maple Leafs leave for Winnipeg to play in the Allan Cup elimination games Monday night.

The Allan Cup

Montreal, Feb. 29.—Establishing hockey history for Montreal the first game in the elimination competition from which a challenger for the Allan Cup will be selected by the Quebec branch of the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association will be played here Tuesday night when Sons of Ireland, champions of the Quebec City Hockey League and Victrolas, champions of the Montreal City Amateur Hockey League will meet.

Forbes Turns Professional

Toronto, Feb. 29.—Vernon Forbes, the brilliant Aura Lee goal keeper, on Saturday afternoon, left the amateur hockey ranks and signed a two year contract with the St. Patricks and then went out and showed them he could stop the shots of the professional players just as well as he could those hurled at him by the amateurs. However, the Senators won the game, one to nothing, and they were restricted to these only by Forbes' splendid work.

Ottawa's victory here put that team far out in front in the race for the double header on Saturday night. Practically out of the running, the Irish have a possible chance of yet overhauling the Senators, but to turn the luck they would need the help of the Canadiens. If St. Patricks had won in Ottawa on Wednesday night and the Senators lost in Montreal on Saturday night the Senators would be in the lead for the leadership with seven victories and three defeats each.

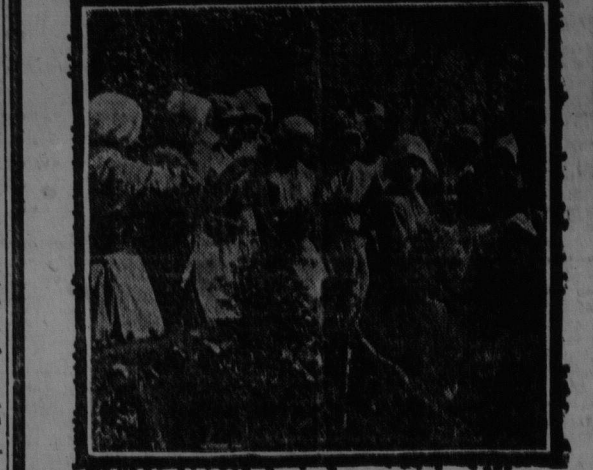
