

BRITISH GOVT WILL NOT BOW TO SINN FEIN

Under No Conceivable Circumstance Will the Gov't Accede to Their Demands.

London, May 6.—In a debate in the House of Lords, Lord Balfour, on behalf of the Government, said it was intended to continue the policy of giving to the Irish executive all possible assistance and support. He added that in no conceivable circumstances would the Government concede the demands of the Sinn Fein, and that the proposal to invite the Sinn Fein to another Irish convention was a proposal wholly out of contact with any realistic reality.

ENRAGED YOUTH KILLS INFANT

Reprimanded for a Misdemeanor, Takes Infant to a Room and Kills it.

Bradford, Pa., May 6.—Leo Kelly, aged 16 years old was arrested by the Bradford police today and charged with the killing of ten months' old baby Gemmill, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Oliver Gemmill, of West Bradford. The killing, according to the police, occurred today, shortly after Mr. Gemmill had reprimanded Kelly, who is the adopted son of James Gemmill, brother of Oliver Gemmill. According to the police, Kelly, a few minutes after the scolding, removed the baby from her crib, took her into another room and killed her. Authorities said tonight that Kelly had been an inmate of an institution for feeble minded.

COUNTER PROPOSAL EXPECTED FROM TURKS

Will Propose That Greek Troops be Withdrawn from Smyrna. That Plebiscite be Held.

London, May 6.—There is reason to believe that Turkey will make a counter proposal to the Entente when she is officially informed that Syria has been divided into three zones, and that a plebiscite be held under the auspices of an Allied force. Should the majority decide in favor of Turkish rule, the despatch adds, the Porte will guarantee to make Smyrna a free port and grant large political and municipal concessions to the Greek element. Moreover, it will guarantee its ability to keep the nationalist forces quiet during the plebiscite.

BATTALION OF POLISH WOMEN

Warsaw, May 6.—A volunteer battalion of women is to be formed by the Polish army for duty in Warsaw and vicinity. Service is for six months and is separate from the women units which have served at the front. The battalion is to have women officers and will do patrol duty at barracks and other places thus relieving men soldiers for more strenuous work.

BRITAIN NOT APPROVING THE POLISH ATTACK

Poland Knows That Boundaries Laid Down by Supreme Council Cannot be Changed by Fighting.

London, May 6.—Great Britain is not giving moral or material assistance to the Polish attack on the Bolsheviks. It is authoritatively stated that Great Britain still stands on what Premier Lloyd George told the Polish Foreign Minister, Stanislas Patek, when the latter was in London, that Britain looked with disfavor on Polish aggression but was willing to help Poland if she were attacked by the Bolsheviks. There were no new conversations between Poland and Great Britain immediately the Premier took his offensive.

NEW CORPORATION GETS GREAT FLEET

By Absorbing Canada Steamship Lines, British Steel Secures Efficient Transportation System.

Montreal, May 6.—(Canadian Press)—By absorbing the Canada Steamship Lines, Limited, the British Empire Steel Corporation will have an efficient and modern inland transportation system which can be utilized to the full, thus putting the new corporation on a better competitive basis with the other steel manufacturing plants located in Ontario and elsewhere. This is the view of J. W. Norcross, President and Managing Director of the Canada Steamship Lines Limited, Mr. Norcross pointed out that the United States Steel Corporation moves a great part of its ore on the Great Lakes in its own bottoms, and has recently acquired shipyards and extra tonnage to move export business on the ocean. If that is a reason for the steel for that great corporation, said Mr. Norcross, it certainly should be a good one for the British Empire Steel Consolidation to follow.

BRITISH TRANSPORT GAINS EFFICIENCY

Railways Now Only One Day Behind in Forwarding from Vessels.

New York, May 6.—Efficiency of the transportation system in England is showing a great improvement, according to the April report of the Port of London Authority. IS BRITAIN LOSING AIR SUPREMACY

English Authorities Claim Aviation Industry Dying in England.

The regular quarterly meeting of the Air Estimates in the House of Commons recently made the statement that the air industry in this country was dying and withering away. Sir Seton Brackner, in an address at University College, Nottingham, but stressed an equally alarming depression. Both these gentlemen are experts in aviation matters, and their opinion is therefore entitled to the utmost respect. They are correct in their views, the country has a right to demand that a new policy should be adopted by the Government before it is too late. We finished the war, let it be remembered, in a position of absolute supremacy in the air. Our pilots, our mechanics, our engines, and our manufacturing were all the best in the world. To have achieved such supremacy in a branch of science in which we were much behind certain Continental nations prior to 1914, was not the least of our triumphs under the strain of a world war. It would surely be a disgrace if we were to be wrested from us now, when the value of the aeroplane in peace is almost as fully demonstrated as in time of war. Yet the coming of peace has already had a most disastrous effect upon the whole of the aviation industry. We had built up at enormous expense and trouble. We do not wish, in any sense, to deny the excellent work which the Civil Aviation Authority and its staff have done during the last few months in the encouragement of commercial aviation. Not only here, but in all parts of the Empire, great efforts have been made to make the path easy for those who are anxious to develop air services, whether for carrying mails, passengers, or goods. Now do we forget that in the Air Estimates for this year there are announced for buildings, etc., amounting to the creation of air routes. But though all this work is most necessary and valuable in its way, the question of aircraft production, whether the aeroplanes are forthcoming to pursue the routes laid down, is a question which is being neglected. The use of aircraft for commercial purposes is still in an experimental stage, and a great deal more experience will be required before we can expect to produce machines which have been designed for carrying passengers.
