

### PREMIER TAKING NO EASTER REST

#### Railway Estimates Expected to Provoke the Big Battle of the Session.

Ottawa, March 23.—Members of parliament were leaving tonight to spend the Easter holiday at home. As the session is a comparatively short one, leaving from tonight until Tuesday, the majority of members from distant constituencies are not able to get away, but a number of those from Ontario and Quebec will take advantage of the opportunity to visit their constituents.

#### Premier Stays Home

Frederick McPherson will not leave the capital during the recess, and it seems likely that the cabinet will be pretty busy mapping out the plan of campaign to be followed when the House reassembles. It is probable that the introduction of the railway estimates will precipitate a fight, as the opposition has some strong criticism to offer of the administration of the government's lines. The debate on the railway situation, and the tariff proposals of the government, to be presented to the House when the budget comes down, are the principal items on the programme for the members when they return.

#### NO CHANGE IN POLICY

Ottawa, March 23.—In reply to various inquiries as to its policy regarding the continuation of unemployment relief, the government announced that no change is contemplated at present.

### Dead French Officer Well Known Here

Three Rivers, March 23.—Well known in Halifax, St. John and throughout the Maritime Provinces, the death is announced, after several months' illness, of Captain Joseph M. Demissal, former officer of the French navy, and director of operations at Three Rivers for a Marcellus ship-building firm. Captain Demissal came to Three Rivers in June, 1915, and was supervising the construction of three ships in the shipyards. He was awarded the Military Medal during the war following the torpedoing of his tanker Moriolana. He was later captured by the Germans when they torpedoed another ship, on board of which he had taken passage and was kept three years in detention. Three times he made unsuccessful attempts to escape. He was born in Marcellus 40 years ago, and leaves a widow and five children at Three Rivers.

### "City of Colombo" Pounds In Storm

#### Engine Room Flooded So Crew Had to Abandon the Wrecked Freighter.

Halifax, N. S., March 23.—According to advices received here late tonight the steamer City of Colombo, from St. John, N. B., for Philadelphia, which stranded on the rocks at Digby Neck, will be a total loss. There was a heavy sea running tonight and the steamer pounded her main mast out. The engine room is full of water, and the crew have abandoned the ship. All hands reached shore in safety.

### Demands Probe of Nova Scotia Labor

#### Bill Introduced to Make County Councillors Responsible Fire Marshals in Districts.

Halifax, N. S., March 23.—During the short session today the House of Assembly went into committee of the whole. Several bills and amendments to acts were brought down by both government and private members.

Hon. O. T. Daniels introduced a bill to amend the Fire Prevention Act, the object being to make the county councillors responsible for reporting fires in their locality, the same as assistant fire marshals.

Forman Way (Labor), Cape Breton, gave notice that at a future date he would move a resolution that the government give some consideration either by the appointment of a commission to investigate or some means of ameliorating unemployment conditions in the industrial areas of the province.

#### FAMOUS ARTIST DEAD

Paris, March 23.—Jean Paul Laurens, the famous French artist, died here today. He was born on March 29, 1838, and had painted many notable pictures. Mr. Laurens studied painting in Toulouse and Paris. He was a Commander of the Legion of Honor.

Champaign, Ills., March 23.—Lieut. Arthur G. Hamilton established a world's record for parachute jumping at Chautau Field this afternoon, when he dropped 24,600 feet. The flyer landed safely eight miles from the field.

### Ask For Railway For Charlotte Co.

#### Delegation Sees Government in Interest of Line Eight Miles Long.

Fredericton, N. B., March 23.—A large delegation, chiefly from Charlotte county, waited upon the Government today to press for the building of a branch line of railway from Foxfield station on the Shore Line to L'Etang, passing through the villages of Beaver Harbor, Dead Man's Harbor and Black's Harbor, the length of the branch to be eight miles. Included in the delegation were: Lewis Connor, president of Connor Brothers, Ltd., and the Maritime Steamship Company, Ltd., and J. J. Hayes, Doonee of Black's Harbor; Neil Cross and Captain Wm. Nelson of Beaver Harbor, B. C. Jussimont of Foxfield, Joseph Gaskill of Grand Manan and Alex. Wilson of the Wilson Box Company, St. John.

The delegates said that the proposed line would serve the wealthiest fishing district of the province and would also open up a district containing extensive mineral deposits, including lignite, copper, silicon and peat. It also was mentioned that help deposits in that vicinity might form the basis of an extensive potash industry. Consideration was promised.
