New York, Dec. 8.—Announcement of the first of a series of awards to Negroes of American resistanding creative work was made Tuesday by the Harmon Foundation and the Commission on the Church and Race Relations of the Federal Council of Churches.

A total of \$3,000 in cash with gold and bronze medals will be distributed in the William E. Harmon awards for distinguished achievement under the direction of Dr. G. E. Haynes, the commission's secretary, in the fields of literature, fine arts, science, including invention, education, business including industry, and religion. Six first prizes of \$400 each with a gold medal and the same number of second prizes of \$100 with a bronze medal were awarded to colored persons who were considered to have created something of national significance in the several fields, and one award of \$500 and a gold medal was given to a white man for outstanding work in improving relations between white and Negro people in Omerica. Formal presentation in the home cities of the successful candidates will be made on January 1 which is Emancipation Day.
