POLICY OF INACTIVITY

Constitutional Democrats Prepared to Shelve Address to People

Peterhof Circles Jubilant Over Changed Situation—Group of Toll Issue Resolution Condemning Ministry

St. Petersburg, July 20.—No further action regarding the proposed address to the people was taken by the lower house of parliament today.

The constitutional democrats members appeared to be anxious to drop the subject if the government is so minded, and there is a disposition to shelve the address by indefinite postponement until the manner of its publication.

Peterhof circles are reported to be jubilant over the discomfiture of the constitutional democrats.

St. Petersburg, July 20.—The resolution adopted by the group of toll, which constitutes a strongly worded indictment of the central government, which is held responsible for the secret propaganda inciting class against class, says: "Realizing the powerlessness to suppress the revolutionary movement as government attempts to break it up by inciting one portion of the population against the other, especially selecting the Jews for victims."

The resolution concludes with another expression of distrust of the ministry, and a demand for its resignation.

The Bourgeois Gazette says that an extraordinary council is sitting this afternoon at Peterhof with general count Ignatieff, the noted reactionary; M. Pobedonosteff, former procurator of the holy synod; and general Trepoff, commander of the palace; M. Stiklitsky, minister of agriculture, and others in attendance, discussing the advisability of the immediate dissolution of parliament.

CENSUS OF PHOENIX

Interesting Statistics Prepared by Pastors of Local Churches

(Special to The Daily News)
Phoenix, July 20.—Rev. Lucille of the Presbyterian church, and Rev. Miller of the Methodist church, have completed so far as it is possible to do so, the work of procuring the names, locations and religious denominations of the families of Phoenix. The total number of families was found to be 188, and the number of children 206. No account was taken of married people without children, or of bachelors and spinsters. There was some difficulty in religious classification on account of so many mixed marriages, but in every case credit was given to the church most frequently attended, and the people were urged to remain faithful to the same both in personal sympathy and financial aid. STUDYING WESTERN METHODS

Japanese Mining Engineer Pays Visit To Boundary Mines and Smelters.

(Special to The Daily News)
Phoenix, July 20.—Yesterday J. Kojima, M.E., from Tokio, Japan, was a visitor in Phoenix, for the purpose of inspecting the mines of the Granby Consolidated being shown over and through the properties by superintendent Smith, having already seen the Granby smelting works at Grand Forks. Mr. Kojima is a mining engineer of note, a graduate of the university of Japan, and is in charge of the Ashio copper mines, one of the largest producers in the land of the Mikado. He left here for Seattle whence he sails next week for home, having spent six months in inspecting the largest and most important mines and metallurgical works in the United States and Canada. He took in the Granby copper mines, the world famous copper, gold and silver producers in those states, not excepting the Homestake mine in South Dakota.

Last of all he visited the Boundary country and the works of the Granby Co.

Mr. Kojima speaks several languages, and has had an opportunity of visiting most of the great producers of gold, silver and copper in the United States in a shorter space of time than many men have accomplished before him, seeing and taking notes of new and improved

processes in mining, concentrating, smelting and refining.

The Ashio mines, of which Mr. Kojima is superintendent, are located about 100 miles in land from Tokio and are the most extensively worked copper mines in Japan. In the Ashio mines he employs some 3200 hands, and as many more in the concentrating and smelting works of the concern, the Furukawa Copper Co., named after the chief owner, Ichibei Furukawa of Tokio.

The Ashio mines have been worked for some 300 years in a primitive manner, but only in comparatively recent years have modern methods prevailed, for which much credit is given to Mr. Furukawa. The properties, which are the largest of their kind in Japan, have some 50 miles of underground workings, and are operated to a depth of 2000 feet. Electricity is used for motive power, there being the best of opportunity for economical hydro-electrical development in the steep mountains of that country.

Last year the Ashio mines produced about 15,000,000 pounds of refined copper. The smelter of the company has seven blast furnaces each with a capacity of 200 tons daily of which four are now in use. The company has also recently completed its own refining works. Laborers receive about 30 cents a day, and the machinery used is of American make. The ore runs about 14 per cent in copper with some silver values, and the refined product is absorbed at home.

He leaves a widow and nine children. Deceased was a native of Edinburgh, Scotland, and had resided in the camp for ten years.

WESTERN CROP OUTLOOK

REPORT BY WILLIAM SAUNDERS, EXPERIMENTAL DIRECTOR

FARMERS ALL AGREE CROPS WILL BE BEST EVER HAD.

(Special to The Daily News)
Ottawa, July 20.—The following telegram has been received at the department of agriculture from William Saunders, director of experimental farms, who is now in the west:

"Indian Head, Sask., July 19.—George F. Chalmers, deputy minister of agriculture: Have seen crops in Manitoba and Saskatchewan to this point. Grain of all sorts well headed and generally very promising. Very little wheat, but wheat and corn are doing well. At experimental farm, Brandon, crops all heavy; found some rust on leaves but none on stalks. No rust on oats or barley. Nearly all grain crops seen in Saskatchewan, including wheat, corn, and peas. Wheat, oats, barley and peas at experimental farm very heavy. Think they are as good as have ever been seen here. No rust found on any of the cereals. Large quantities of alfalfa, timothy, clover, and other forage crops are in excellent condition. The department of agriculture is making arrangements for a cold storage car service for the carriage of fruit, similar to which has proven such an advantage in the delivery of the produce. Last year an average of 10 cold storage cars a day were used in the distribution of butter and cheese."

TIME LIMIT ON STRIKES

Odessa Strikers Must Resume Work on Monday or Go Into Exile

General Kaulbars Issues Brul Order—Any Attempt at Resistance Will Be Mercilessly Crushed by Military

Odessa, July 20.—Governor-general Kaulbars has issued an order that all striking workmen in the city must resume work by July 23 without fail, otherwise they and all those who support them will be sent into exile by administrative order, and every attempt to prolong strikes will be mercilessly crushed by force of arms.

The strikers are incensed by the order which it is feared may provoke an outbreak.

(Later)—The harbor strikers will resume work tomorrow. Fearing bloodshed in consequence of the governor-general's order, the employers today came to an agreement with the workmen, accepting most of the latter's demands.

The party of students from the school of mines of the state university of North Dakota, headed by E. J. Babcock, dean of the school, whose advent here was reported yesterday, spent an exceedingly pleasant and profitable day at the Hill Mining & Smelting company's plant yesterday. In the morning, headed by the dean, the party made its way to the smelter, where they were met by superintendent R. R. Hiley, and shown over the plant.

After a busy morning, the professor and his students were so pleased with what they saw that they returned, and spent the afternoon inspecting and taking notes and sketches.

Being pressed for time the party will leave for the south this morning and so have not time to visit the Consolidated plant at Trail as they hoped to.

Dean Babcock was greatly pleased with his visit here and declared last evening that arrangements would be made next year by the school for an extended visit here of a goodly number of students.

"I have visited a great many mining camps and mining centers in the west," said the dean last evening, "but I have never come across a spot so delightfully situated as Nelson. Western people are probably kind to visitors, but I could not have been shown more consideration than I have received here.
