Ontario Cities Awake to Industrial Expansion.

Ontario municipalities are taking a more aggressive attitude with regard to securing of new industries. The opportunities that undoubtedly face Ontario cities to secure industries finances by either English or American capital are being more generally recognized. The border cities on the Detroit River have seemed this year several industries connected with the manufacture of automobiles. Prospects secured within the space of one week numbered twenty four according to a statement by the Industrial Commissioner of the border municipalities. This included four automobile, three automobile accessory, six iron and steel and two textile companies. Certain other cities are equally as active. 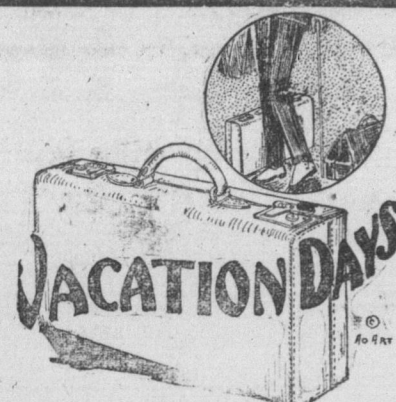
