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## Hamilton Win From Dentsals 5 to 3

### Tigers Take Group Honors

Hamilton, Feb. 26.—In another of those ding-dong battles that have characterized all of their many clashes, the Tigers to-night eliminated the Dentsals from the O.H.A. senior championship race by defeating them by 5 to 3. The Dents came here with a lead of one goal as the result of last Saturday's game in Toronto, and even their most sanguine supporters felt that they had their work cut out for them to maintain the advantage. As a result there was very little speculation on to-night's contest.

There is no question about the Bengals being entitled to to-night's victory, they having the better of the play in practically every period, although there were times when it looked as though they had a mighty tough row to hoe in order to come out on top. Both teams were at full strength and while the locals were playing with the desperation of despair, the Dents were hanging on with a grim determination. In fact, after about ten minutes of battling in the first period they increased their advantage, when Hudson took a nice pass from Box and scored the first goal of the game, giving the visitors a lead of two goals. That looked to be about enough to win the round and the group honors.

Green Scores Tiger's First  
It was not long, however, before the local fans were given occasion to cheer, for Green evened the score by accepting a pass from Roach and carrying the puck right in past Stewart. Shortly before the period ended McCarthy accepted another of Roach's passes and shot another, which hit Stewart on the face and bounded past him into the net, thus evening up the

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score on the round.  
Dents regained their advantage in the second period when, after nineteen minutes of play, Watson, who had been put on as a substitute, beat Reaume with a wicked shot. It looked like the easiest goal of the night, and even Reaume was disgusted, when he discovered that it had gone by him.

With the score two all on the game and the Dents one ahead on the round there was gloom in the Tiger camp at the end of the second period, and it became almost impenetrable when early in the third session Box went down the ice alone, and eluding the whole Tiger team, shot one past Reaume. But that proved to be the very thing needed to stir the Tigers into real action, and from that on they literally swept the Dents off their feet. First Roach and Green combined for one of the prettiest goals of the game, and shortly afterwards McCarthy shot one from the outside of the defense that found its way past Stewart and again evening the score on the round. Then, with only a couple of minutes to play and both teams battling for all that was in them, McCarthy made a beautiful corner shot that gave the Tigers the lead on the round.

Tigers Play Safe  
The Dents, in an attempt to regain their lost laurels, moved Brown up from the defense to the forward line, leaving Box alone on the rear guard, but although the visitors bombarded the Tiger goal they were unable to get one past Reaume. The Tigers took no chances, playing the game safe and wasting a much time as they could without incurring a penalty, and they succeeded in holding their opponents at bay until the final bell came as a welcome relief.  
The game was fast and furious all the way, and both teams put up a brilliant brand of hockey in spots. The Tigers indulged in more combination than they have shown in previous games, and this accounts for their winning the game and the round. Four of their five goals were scored on passes, whereas in their former games practically all of their tallies were made on individual rushes. Green and McCarthy were unquestionably the stars of the local aggregation, but Roach also turned in one of his best performances and Reaume did valuable work between the posts.

The Dents were stronger on the defense than on the forward line. Despite the rough handling he received last Saturday night, Box appeared to be in fine fettle, and his rushes were one of the features, while his goal in the last period was easily the most spectacular of the game. Brown also made some grand rushes, but he found the Tiger defense more difficult to penetrate than on former occasions. With Box, however, he managed to break up a number of the Tigers' attempts to score, and but for the work of this pair the local would unquestionably have had a commanding lead before the close of the first period. Watson, who was used as a substitute, performed creditably while on the ice, and had the honor of scoring one of the visitors' goals.

## "INDUSTRIAL MAY"

EMPLOYERS AND EMPLOYEES IN CONFERENCE

LONDON, Feb. 28.—The feeling prevailed in official circles to-day that the creation of an "Industrial Parliament" containing representatives of capital and labor, together with the miners decision to postpone the strike until March 22, has temporarily averted the labor crisis. Nobody, however, was willing to predict that the situation has been eased up more than temporarily.

## Situation in Central Germany is Wors

Cabinet Will Take Decided Measures.

ARMY OF GENERAL SECURITY FORMED

ZURICH, Feb. 28.—The German cabinet, following a three-hour session, decided to take the most energetic measures to suppress the revolution, according to dispatches from Berlin to-day.

It was also reported that an ultimatum was sent to the "illegal soviet government" at Munich.  
The situation in Central Germany was said to be growing worse. State of siege has been proclaimed at Aischaffenburg. The physicians in Leipzig were reported to have gone on strike. Government officials in Barmen, Herne, Gelsenkirchen and Dortmund have formed an "arm of general security," numbering 16,000 to oppose the Spartacists.

There were some reports, however, that the strike in the Ruhr district is disintegrating and that only 15,000 workmen are remaining idle.  
Unconfirmed reports were received that Spartacists in Berlin staged demonstrations in Wilhelmstrasse before the Reichstag and other points Tuesday evening, in which the lines were exchanged. Several telephone lines were set to have been cut.

The soviet congress in Munich understood to have decided to open a provisional central council, which will be instructed to form a ministry. The Landtag will be convoked later.

GOVERNMENT ISOLATED AT WEIMAR

BERLIN, Feb. 28.—The German government was practically isolated in Weimar to-day. The only method of communication was by airplane.

SITUATION AT MUNICH IS GRAVE

PARIS, Feb. 28.—The situation at Munich is grave, according to the Berlin Vossische Zeitung. Spartacist forces are not only masters of a public buildings and transportation services in the city, but have also seized the presses on which the government bank notes are printed. These presses, it is said by Berl Lokal Anzeiger, are kept busy.

Foodstuffs are being rationed at Munich. The amounts issued to the bourgeoisie being only half of the given Spartacists.
