

Football Teams Show Strength on Saturday

Results of Contests Were Not Unexpected—Large Crowds Were Out and Great Enthusiasm Was Shown.

The real strength of the teams of the Brantford and Paris League was revealed to a great extent on Saturday, and the game which showed where the strength lay also brought out the weakness of the lesser units. It was a day of great encounters, and above all Cocksutt's and Tutela proved themselves teams that will take a great deal of approaching. Cocksutt's made light of the P. S. A. boys, who played pluckily and were leading at the beginning of the second half. It is an old trick, however, and soon the superiority of the United showed itself, as they went ahead and won, easily within themselves.

If the back had cleared well there would have been no alleged fluke. In baseball a mistake that allows a run is not called a fluke. It is an error, and the more errors the poorer the team. This applies equally to football, where errors are not counted. Tutela are now in the first round proper of the Courier Cup, and they look equal to going much further.

Scots Excel Themselves.
 Holmedale Tigers were not a little surprised when the hardy Scots scored twice and carried two points away from the O.S.B. grounds. In front of goal the Tigers were errant, or they might have tagged the visitors down to a point. They never seemed to get the measure of the lively Scots, who were fairly fast and tricky. The defence could not be blamed for the adverse score, as both goals were dandies and the outcome of good initiative.

If they had one sharpshooter who could convert opportunities it would improve the Wanderers team 100 per cent. The Sons played vigorously, and were a determined lot, and it was noteworthy that a good deal of the roughness complained of last week was eliminated. They were value for the points.
