Is head of the firm of William Law & Co., shipping and commission merchants, Yarmouth. First returned to Ho. of Assem. at last g. e. A Liberal and a Free Trader. Believes that a repeal of the B. N. A. Act would be beneficial to N. S.—*Yarmouth, N.S.*

LAWRENCE FREDERICK ANDREW, Q.C. (*Colchester.*)

Parents came from Melrose, Scot., and settled in Inverness Co., Cape Breton, of which his father was Sheriff for thirty years. B. at Port Hood. C.B., 1844. Ed. at Antigonish Academy, Normal Sch. and at Dalhousie Coll. M., 1868, at Truro, N.S., Isabelle Flemming. Called to the Bar, 1869, and apptd. a Q.C. by N.S. Govt. Has been Recorder of Truro since 1881. First returned to House of Assem. at last g.e. A Liberal.—*Truro, N.S.*

LONGLEY, Hon. JAMES WILBERFORCE, M.A. (*Annapolis.*)

Paternal great-grandf. was a U. E. Loyalist, who settled in Annapolis Co. Maternal grandf. Rev. James Manning, was b. in Irel., and was one of the pioneer Baptist Ministers of N.S. B. at Paradise, N.S., 4 Jan. 1849. Ed. at Acadia Coll., N.S., where he graduated B.A., June, 1871. M., 3 Sept., 1877, Miss Annie Brown, of Paradise. Called to the Bar, N.S., 10 Sept. 1875. Apptd. 13 Sept. 1882, a Commr. for revising and consolidating the Statutes of the Province. Has been on the editorial staff of the *Acadian Recorder*, Halifax, and has been a frequent contributor to magazines and other literary periodicals. Sworn a mem. of the Ex. Council, 28 July, 1884, and apptd. Attorney-General 25 May, 1886. First returned to Ho. of Assem., N.S., at g.e. 1882 and re-elected at last g.e. A Liberal of pronounced views. Believes in Commercial Union with the U.S.; a union of the Maritime Provinces; the abolition of the Legislative Council, and that the Senate is a needless feature in our institutions.—*Halifax, N.S.*
