



Hockey Tigers repeat Lobster Pot

THE DALHOUSIE TIGERS men's Hockey Team repeated its performance in its own Lobster Pot Tournament of two weeks ago over the weekend at the University of Moncton Tournament. The Tigers squared off against a tough out-of-region team in its first game of the Moncton tourney on Friday and as in the Lobster Pot, the Tigers won the first game by a 5-4 score in a shoot-out. The Tigers' opposition in Moncton were the Regina Cougars. The Dalhousie squad had played the defending CIAU Champions, the York Yeomen in the opening game of the Lobster Pot.

Also as in the Lobster Pot, the Tigers faced the Moncton Blue Eagles in second round competiton and the outcome was again the same, a Blue Eagle victory. Unlike the 7-2 Moncton win in their first meeting, however, the finals score in Moncton was 7-5 in favour of the Blue Eagles.

In the Regina contest, the Tigers were led by the solid goaltending of Rick Reusse. Reusse stopped 33 of 36 shots in regulation time and then thwarted 8 of 9 penalty shots in the overtime shoot-out.

Tiger goals came from the sticks of Terry Crowe, Jerry Scott, Kevin Reynolds, Jamie Jefferson and Greg Royce. Regina goals were scored by Mark Readeke with two goals, Lee Petterson and Randy Udahl.

The Tigers also counted 36 shots on goal.

In the Moncton contest played on Saturday evening, the blue Eagles were led by Claude Vilgrain who tallied twice for the victors. Other Moncton goals came from Mike Fafard, Francois

Sills, Claude Lefebure, Claude Gosselin and Francois Boudreau. The Tigers countered with two goals from Scott and singles by

Brian MacDonald, Jefferson and Chris Veno. Shots on goal were 38-32 in

favour of Moncton. The Tigers now have an exhi-

bition record of 2-2 with both the losses coming at the hands of the Blue Eagles.

The Tigers will be on the road this weekend to play Mount Allison and Moncton.
