Thanks for your note of the 17th, with a clipping from the Fort Erie News.

My recollection is that in 1931 the Census Commissioners were invariably appointed on a partisan basis and that we recommended them, exactly as was done by the present Government, and therefore it is not open to us to raise particular h—about the method adopted on this occasion.

What we have seized upon is the statement made by the Minister that the Commissioners are to consult with the Members and the defeated candidates, and so far as I am concerned he has gone that far, even to the extent of writing a letter to the Commissioner in my constituency asking him to conform. In some cases the Commissioners are refusing to conform and in every instance in which I have approached him in that regard action has been taken. I do not know definitely what the results are.

Of course I think we have got to direct our barrage to the whole theory of taking the census at this time.
