

I would again call the attention of the Directors, as I have on former occasions, to the great necessity of substituting gas for coal-oil in lighting the building, and trust before another year passes by that my suggestion in that respect will be acted upon. The use of coal-oil is highly dangerous both to life and property, and the change could doubtless be made without incurring very great expense or annoyance. I would also recommend that a telephone be placed in the Home, which would be of very great convenience to all connected with it.

We are deeply indebted to Dr. W. P. Caven and Dr. J. D. Thorburn, for the assistance they have rendered on all occasions during the past year; and I have also pleasure in bearing testimony to the worth of Miss McKay, who does all she can to make the boys comfortable.

The public and Municipality of Toronto are very much indebted to the ladies who have taken such a deep interest in the work of the Home.
