2. Parse fully each word of "*Equestris autem praelii ratio et cedentibus et insequentibus par atque idem periculum inferebat.*"

3. Decline, *together*, in the singular only, *tofo hoc genere*, and *dispari praelio* in both numbers. Decline also the noun *res* throughout.

4. Give the principal parts of the verbs to which belong *fieri*, *discedere*, *cognoverat*, *auderent*, *inferebat*. Write out the tenses *utimur* and *auderent*.

5. In the above extracts:—

(a) *ad celeritatem onerandi*. How does this construction differ from that of *armandas naves* at end of extract (A)?

(b) *quam quibus* in *reliquis utimur maribus*. What case? Give Rule.

(c) *ea quæ sunt usui*. What case? Explain its use.

(d) *convenire jubet*. What would this have been if "*imperat*" had been used instead of "*jubet*"?

6. Name four classes of *Numerals*, and give Latin for "ten," "tenth," "ten each," "ten times."

7. Translate into Latin:—1. On the same day, ambassadors, sent by the enemy, came to Cæsar about peace. 2. Leap down, fellow-soldiers, if you do not wish to abandon the eagle to the enemy. 3. When he had said this with a loud voice, he threw himself from the ship.

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1. Parse carefully, explaining the Syntax, each word of:—

"I had (= would) rather be a dog and bay the moon
Than such a Roman."

2. What prepositions do the following words require after them:—*dependent*, *independent*, *confer*, *differ*, *exception*, *disappointed*, *taste*, *wait*? Form short sentences of your own, introducing these words to show this sequence.

3. Distinguish between an *adjective* and a *participle*. Construct three sentences in which the present participle of the verb *to walk* shall be, (1) a participle proper, (2) an adjective, (3) a noun.

4. Show, by introducing them each in a short sentence, that every one of the following expressions may be correct. "As good as I," "As good as me," "A friend of my brother," "A friend of my brother's," "All but her."
