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BALMY DAYS OF SUNSHINE PROMISE THE NEAR APPROACH OF ANOTHER SEED TIME

Happy is the man who facilitates spring operations by a little forethought now. Take small grains, for instance. Every day that seeding is delayed means that much of a decrease in the yield. At the same time the soil must be thoroughly well prepared, as the state of the seed bed is just as important a factor in securing large yields as is early seeding. Both of these requirements to large production may be secured by getting ready for the spring rush now—seed on hand, implements in repair and, of more importance yet, new wide working implements to take the place of the old ones.
