

RESOLVED, That the printed paper mentioned in the resolution of this House, of the seventh of this month, is one of the Gazettes printed by Edward Edwards, printer at *Montreal*.

And the other resolution of the Committee being also read, and the question put thereon, the House again divided :

Nays 5

And the same being also carried in the affirmative.

RESOLVED, That Isaac Tod, of *Montreal*, Esquire, merchant, was President at a dinner given at *Montreal*, in the month of March 1805, in Dillon's Tavern, by the Merchants of that City, to the Representatives of the Town and County of *Montreal*, and that he there gave the sixth, seventh, eighth, ninth, tenth, eleventh and twelfth toasts, inserted in the said printed paper.

Mr. *Bedard* then moved to resolve, seconded by Mr. *Berthelot*,

That Isaac Tod, Esquire, merchant, of the City of *Montreal*, having published the Libel, mentioned in the resolutions of this House, of the seventh of this month, at a dinner given at *Montreal*, in the month of March, one thousand eight hundred and five, in *Dillon's* Tavern, by the merchants of *Montreal*, to the Representatives of the City and County of *Montreal*, where he was President, is guilty of a high breach of the privileges of this House.

The House divided upon the question, and the names being called for, they were taken down as follows, *vizt* :
