The Bill, entitled, "An Act for the Relief of certain confcientious "Perfons from being obliged to take Oaths in the ufual Forms, "was read a fecond time, and *Ordered* to be engrofsed, and read a third Time To-Morrow.

Mr. Day prefented a Petition from the Freeholders of the Township of Newport, praying a Repeal of the Turnpike Law, which was Ordered to lie on the Table.

The House adjourned to Eleven o'Clock To-Morrow.

## Wednesday, 14th June 1786.

The Petition of *Thomas Watfon*, Efqr, praying to be allowed to take his Seat as a Member for the County of *Cumberland*, was received and read, and the House thereupon refolved to take the same into Consideration in a Committee of the whole House.

The Houfe refolved itfelf into a Committee of the whole Houfe and Mr. *Fillis's* having taken the Chair.

Mr. Walfon was called on, and examined before the Committee, as alfo theSecretary of the Province, and thereupon,

Refolved, That it appearing to this Committee that in the Writ which was iffued at the Request of the House of Assembly, for a Member for the County of Cumberland, in the Room of Christopher Harper, Esp; the Words two M mbers had been erroneously inferted by a Clerk in the Secretary's Office, instead of the Words one Member, and that Thomas Watson the Petitioner had been elected and returned under such Mistake (the County of Cumberland being fully represented by John Butler Dight, Esqr; and Mr. Philip Marchinton) the faid Thomas Watson cannot be received as a Member for that County in Confequence of such Election.

Resolved, That Mr. Watfon be allowed a reasonable Compensation for the Expences incurred by him in Consequence of fuch Election.

The Speaker refumed the Chair.

Mr. Fillis, Chairman of the Committee reported the above Proceedings of faid Committee, which were agreed to unanimoufly by the Houfe.

A Petition from *Henry Folger*, in Behalf of feveral diftreffed Families from Nantucket, was prefented to the Houfe and read, and thereupon ordered, that a Committee of three Members be appointed to wait on His Excellency the Governor, to requeft he would be pleafed to make Application to Major General Campbell to allow the feveral Families mentioned in the above Petition to be accommodated in fome of the vacant Military Buildings belonging to Government, until they can be better provided for; Mr. Leckie, the Solicitor General, and Mr. Marchinton, were appointed for that Purpofe.

The Solicitor General acquainted the Houle, that Mr. Pyke and Mr. Marchinton and himself had waited on His Excellency the B Governor
