THE SITUATION

The notable victory of the French forces on the Verdun front can be classed as of the very first importance. As far back at July 3rd last, a semi-official statement was issued from Berlin in part as follows:-

"Whatever may have been the importance of the possession of Verdun, and whatever may be the actual strategic value now, the dogged defence by the French garrison and the equally resolute determination of the German besiegers have so tremendously enhanced the significance of the issue that the moral effect of the final result cannot fail to be of importance surpassing that of any previous event of the war."

Accordingly for months, the troops of the Kaiser, under the Crown Prince, have been bending every effort to obtain the mastery at the point named. The outcome has been that Joffre's men have not only withstood every assault, but have in addition been quick to seize upon the transfer of troops to other points by penetrating the German lines to a depth of two miles and regaining the village of Douaumont and other important points. It cannot be characterized as otherwise than a glorious piece of work.




