Without consideration of the fact that such sudden changes are destructive of business stability, the territorial authorities have seen fit to usurp the proper functions of the town government and have saddled upon the community legislation of so drastic a nature that a financial upheaval is seriously threatened.

That this action has been taken with a sincere purpose of elevating the moral tone of the community we decline to believe. The previous policy of the government upon the same question is so extremely inconsistent with its present attitude that the element of sincerity seems altogether wanting. This theory is strengthened, moreover, when viewed in the light of Gov. Ross' repeated statements that he purposed relieving himself entirely of any care in respect to local affairs. The governor's position in that particular has been referred to in detail in these columns on several occasions and is amiliar to the public.

Irrespective, however, of the question of motive, there is natural obection on the part of the citizens of Dawson at interference from the territorial government in matters with which the city council is competent to deal. The taxpayers sustain the expense connected with the city government and it is by

means surprising that they demand that the officials elected and paid by them shall constitute a government and not a plaything. In making this contention they occupy a position which is absolutely sound and in-

If anything more were needed, it may be said that the inconsistencies which have so characterized the Yuon council's manipulation of local iffairs are of themselves sufficient to warrant the community in asking that the city government have exclusive control of city mattersf

Watching for the Blakeley.

Victoria, July 17.-The protracted absence of the brig Blakeley, which was dispatched to Cocos Island to search for buried treasure there, is the friends of those aboard. The ship was well found, manned and provisioned when she left here early in January, and the friends of those who composed the expedition regned themselves to a long wait without tidings. Still it was confidently expected that by the first of May the brig would be back, either with the treasure so confidently sought, or with the news of the nonsuccess of the expedition.' H. H. Jones, the president of the company, has no doubts about the safety of the ship and attributes the delay to difficulties similar to those which confronted the party from the Imperieuse when that vessel visited visited the island on a similar errand. The absence of news, while disquieting, is shorn of the ominous eatures which would attach to simiar circumstances attending the voyage of a ship through frequented waters. The Blakeley is far out of the beaten track of commerce on the high seas, and hence her failure to speak any other craft since her departure from the Straits conveys little significance. When the little sealer R. L. Morse, of this port was battling for her life in the storm which proved so disastrous to her off the California coast, a brig drove past her in the smother which from the description given by the Morse's crew, local mariners believe, was the treasure ship.
