Fifteen hundred barrels and five hundred bushel boxes of apples were picked from the famous orchard on the Cobourg road, owned by Mr. James Phillips, this fall. This orchard includes thirty acres, fifteen of which are bearing with about six different varieties. The apples were purchased by Mr. D. Coyle, of Cobourg, and the price paid was six thousand dollars. For the two years previous Mr. Phillips received \$6,800 and \$8,300 for the orchard.

Last week Judge Deroche of Belleville delivered sentence in the case of William Bayette, found guilty of arson in connection with the fire which destroyed the mill property of the Pearce Co. at Marmora some time ago. Bayette was given an indeterminate sentence of not less than three months and a further period thereafter, not to exceed in all two years less one day. Judge Deroche noted the strange fact of a man reaching mature life without offence, suddenly being found guilty of a deed that might have meant long term of imprisonment.

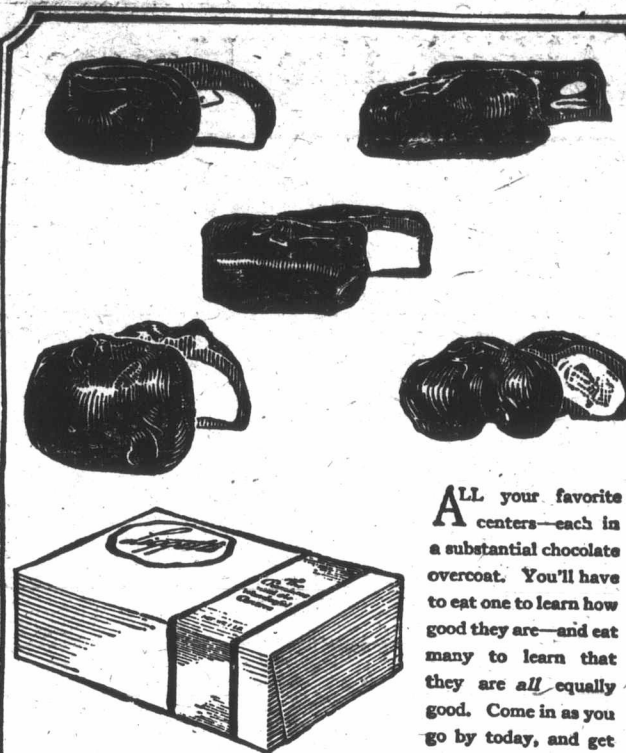
